—At its meeting Tuesday evening, Colfax Lodge No. 4, Degree of Rebekah, will have an initiation and a social occasion at which several officials and members of nearby towns are expected as guests.

—The board of supervisors will meet tomorrow in Fort Madison to canvass the vote of the election of November 3rd. It is not expected that there will be any changes in the results as already announced, although there will probably be some slight changes in the figures.

—The Iowa Loan and Realty company has conveyed to John H. Cole, lots 6, 7, 8, and 9 in block 5. The consideration was \$4,900, according to the warranty deed filed with Recorder Vaughan. The property is on Blondeau street between Water and First street and will be used in the reconstruction of the bridge.

—The Keokuk police force would like to get hold of Ben Stevenson and in order to enforce their desire the Quiboy Herald says the police there received a request from Officer Pearson of this city in which the officer describes "Stevenson as having a 'bulldog face' with long chin and conspicuous teeth, a rough looking chap, 5 feet 6 inches tall. He does not say for what he wants him, but doubtless will be welcome to him in case he shows up here."

—It is rumored that the chief officers of the Iowa National Guard are employing every possible effort to obtain permission from the government to form an aviation corps in connection with the guard, and it is thought likely that permission will be granted and funds allowed for the forming of the corps. Adjutant General Logan returned from Washington, where he placed the proposition before the officers of the military department, but no decision has been reached. The plan, as it is understood, is to have the war department furnish each pilot with an airplane. An aviation corps will then be organized of men who will serve when they enlist to give at least thirty days' military service each year and to respond if there is any call for actual war duty.

—The Fort Madison Democrat in its Friday issue made the following political comment: Announcement was made today by Clerk-elect O. R. Johnston that Al. Volders would be his deputy at Keokuk. The appointee is a well known man, a brother of the members, Ed. Volders of this city and like Mr. Johnston, in the grocery business. G. N. Vermillion, the present deputy auditor at Keokuk, and F. C. Chambers, now deputy recorder at Fort Madison, will retain their place according to the general understanding. Wm. Reinhold, the treasurer-elect, has not announced his deputy. His present office partner, holding temporary position at Fort Madison, H. J. Kennedy, is not an applicant for the place.
