

# Keokuk Shows New Strength in Mt. Pleasant Game

## MT. PLEASANT 70, KEOKUK HIGH 0

Use of Forward Pass Enables Visitors to Roll up Big Score on the Local Team Yesterday.

### PLAYED A GOOD GAME

Mt. Pleasant Was Held to Low Score in First Half—Keokuk Shows Improvement.

Although defeated by the big score of 70 to 0, Keokuk high school football team in their game with Mt. Pleasant here yesterday afternoon, put up a real fight for the first time this season. Playing a team that was heavier, faster and much more experienced, the Purple and White had little hopes of winning, but they played with determination and made the visitors work for the scores they made.

Strickler, playing first at left and latter at right half, lead the fight against the invaders, both on defense and offense. Time and again he cut in from his end position and threw the man with the ball for big losses. In carrying the ball he was able to pick the holes and he kept going as long as there was a chance to gain. The work of Roberts was second only to that of Strickler. Both these youngsters have showed wonderful improvement since the first games of the season and next season should be towers of strength to the local high school team. The other members of the team also played better than they have at any other time this year. They worked together better, they played harder, and despite the fact that they were defeated by a margin of 70 points they are deserving of credit.

Had it not been for their use of the forward pass, Mt. Pleasant would have made very few touchdowns during the game. Much over half the ground they gained was made through the use of the pass, all of them long ones of from 20 to 30 yards. Kinsinger was very accurate in his throwing of the ball while the men who worked on the receiving end were equally as good. All but three or four of their passes were completed successfully and were good for long gains.

The first quarter of the game was a pretty and interesting fight between the two teams, with neither one having much advantage. Mt. Pleasant scored but six points in this period, their gains being made on line bucks and end runs. Keokuk carried the ball nearly half the time during this session, the backs punching the line for first downs on a number of occasions.

**Used Shift Plays.**  
In the second period Mt. Pleasant began the use of their forward passes and uncorked a few shift plays that were good for substantial gains. They made two touchdowns in this period, one of them being made on a long pass, Kinsinger to Morris. Tribby bucked through the line for the other marker after the ball had been advanced down the field on forward passes and end runs. The first half ended with the score at 19 to 0.

In the third and fourth quarters, the use of the long passes made it possible for the visitors to gain almost at will, although they found it a hard proposition to punch the line or circle the ends. Twice when they had carried the ball to within a few feet of the Keokuk goal line they were held for downs, only to have Weess, Keokuk quarter, kick the ball straight up in the air and give them another opportunity to score.

Weess handled his team well and showed good judgment in his selection of plays. Keokuk did not resort to the use of the forward pass. Coach Hudson's shifts in the lineup of the team worked out well. With Captain Drummond at left tackle the line seemed twice as strong as it had in previous games. The good showing made by the team left the boys optimistic and they have every hope of being able to defeat Ft. Madison in the final game of the season to be played here Thanksgiving day.

## AMES DEFEATED BY IOWA 26 TO 6

Crowd of 11,000 Sees State University Defeat State College at Ames Yesterday Afternoon.

### KANSAS DEFEATED 35-0

Nebraska Overwhelms Kansas, Taking Missouri Valley Honors for Fourth Straight Year.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] AMES, Iowa, Nov. 14.—Before a crowd of 10,000 the state university eleven from Iowa City defeated the state college team here today, 26 to 6, scoring in the first, third and fourth periods. Gross and Reeves made touchdowns in the first period, but Ames failed to catch the kick out, scores 7 to 6.

In the second period, Arretson went through for a touchdown, but failed for goal. Ames stiffened in the third period but could not stop Iowa and was unable to get away with end runs. In the final period, Iowa rolled up 13 more. Gross scored after several good end runs.

**Kansas Defeated.**  
LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 14.—Nebraska Cornhuskers overwhelmed the Kansas University Jayhawkers on Nebraska field this afternoon, 35 to 0, thereby clearly establishing their title to the Missouri Valley championship. This makes four successive years that the Nebraskans have carried away the Valley honors.

The Kansas Huskies never had a chance from the start until they were floundering about with their tongues hanging out at the finish. The whistle was a welcome sound. Nebraska used nothing but straight football throughout, going through the heavy Kansas line and around the ends at will.

The corn huskers emerged from the game without a man injured and will go into Iowa next Saturday with their team intact.

**CLINTON WOULD PLAY EASTERN CHAMPIONS**  
Business Men Raise \$1,000 to Bring Eastern School Team Here to Play.

CLINTON, Iowa, Nov. 14.—Clinton has a suggestion as to the proposed inter-sectional contest for the benefit of the Red Cross fund. Principal F. F. Webb of the local high school has announced that if negotiations were actually opened for the game suggested by President James of Illinois he would write to the promoters offering to second the Clinton high school football team against the best eastern high school team. Clinton lays claim to the middle western championship, and Principal Webb believes a game between the champions of the two sections would be a good curtain raiser for the big game.

Clinton plays West Des Moines high on Thanksgiving day for the state title. Local business men already have raised a fund of \$1,000 to bring the Manchester, N. H., team here for a post-season game. Manchester is fighting for eastern honors with Everett high of Boston.

President Webb proposes that the Clinton-Manchester game be played as a curtain raiser to the big inter-sectional college game, should it be arranged. The \$1,000 of Clinton business men's money is back of the Clinton team if arrangement is made.

**MARSHALL TO GET CHANCE WITH GIANTS**  
Former Keokuk Player, Now Owned by Denver, Will Be Given Try-out by McGraw.

Davenport Times: Bobby Marshall, Blue Sox catcher, who was drafted from Davenport by Denver, is going to the New York Giants next spring, according to a tip dropped here by Dick Kinsella, who is now a scout for the New York Giants. Kinsella said New York bought Marshall from Denver after the draft was completed. This statement was verified by Owner McGill, of Denver.

J. T. Hayes offered Kinsella \$600, the draft price, for the return of Marshall, but Kinsella refused. Kinsella saw Marshall in action in the Central association last season and is much impressed with his work. Marshall will go on the training trip with the Giants in the spring and will be given every chance to make good, says Kinsella.

## TIGERS FIGHT YALE TO FINISH

With Score 19 to 0 Against Them, Princeton Turns and Batters Bull Dog to Finish.

### FINAL SCORE 19 TO 14

Yale's Use of Passes Will Make Trouble for Harvard in Their Game Next Saturday.

[By Hal Sheridan, written for the United Press.] PRINCETON, N. J., Nov. 14.—For the first time since 1910, a Yale eleven triumphed over Princeton here today. The score was 19 to 14. The Tiger was out-fought and out-generated, but never out-gamed.

With the Blue team on the long end of a 19 to 0 score at the end of the third period, the Princeton Tiger, battered and torn, ripped into the Bulldog with a finish that was amazing.

Before the wounded Jungo-cat was through its dying fight, in that last fifteen minutes of rip and smash it had torn 14 points from the pelt of the bull dog. Going at the rate they were when the referee's whistle ended the battle, and given more good time it might have been Princeton and not Yale students who pranced on the field after the game for the famous snake dance and to burn some steel dollars worth of perfectly good fifty cent programs.

**Relative Strength Not Shown.**  
While those 14 points mean a lot to Princeton and are a grand tribute to the fight the Tigers always show, they should not be counted in dopings up the relative strength of the two teams.

Those 14 points were due to a case of mistaken identity. Coach Hinkey of Yale, didn't recognize the team he was fighting. He shot in an entirely new eleven of second string men at the start of the fourth period and then the Sons of Nassau got their mad up. During the sensational rush for the first Tiger touchdown, Hinkey sent Legore and Ainsworth back into the game. It did no good for in almost an unbelievably quick time the Orange and Black tide swept over the Blue goal for a second tally.

**Tigers Make Sudden Turn.**  
Up to that first march down the field in the fourth quarter, Princeton had failed to make a single first down. It was Moore who pulled the trick with a fifteen yard dash around Yale's left end. In two more plays, Princeton got another first down on Yale's 25 yard line. In six more plays Moore scored. From their own 15 yard line Princeton hammered and drove through what had been a Yale defense for the second touchdown without once losing the ball. Glick catapulting himself over the Blue goal, after Yale had braced momentarily and withstood three drive drives.

It was all Yale in these first three periods, while the full offense was working. If Harvard proved a gurgernaut against Princeton a week ago, Yale proved an avalanche today with her regulars at the guns. Impenetrable when Princeton had the ball, Yale fairly tore up the turf in offense. Instead of opening up, the Tigers proved disappointing. It was Yale that tried the lid of conservatism and threw it away. The forward passing of plunging Legore was a revelation. Nothing has ever been seen like it on a foot ball field before. The way Legore, Ainsworth, Knowles and Wilson got away from 15 to 40 yards on a double, triple, quadruple and lateral passes was nothing short of legendary. Championship basket ball teams have shown less efficiency in passing. It was chiefly by this freakish play that Yale got her three touchdowns, but straight old fashioned attack was not to be sneezed at.

**Trouble for Harvard.**  
Even if Harvard next Saturday solves the problem of Yale's crisis-ridden almost throw-as-you-please passing system, the Crimson will have its hands full stopping Legore, Knowles and Ainsworth, the three original human Krupp guns. Princeton, as noted, got only six first downs—all of them in the last period. Throughout the game the losers got 175 yards on rushing the ball from scrimmage. At least 125 yards was gained in the fourth quarter. Yale rushed the ball 389 yards for 14 first downs. On fourteen punts Yale averaged forty yards, Princeton averaged 43 yards on twenty-three punts.

Today's game was the real dedication of Princeton's new Palmer stadium. It was the first time either Bull Dog or Tiger had crossed each other's line for a touchdown in four years. Nearly 38,000 spectators saw the contest.

Harvard and Brown—the former with a substitute team—battled to a 0-0 tie at Cambridge. Pennsylvania was easy for Dartmouth, the Green piling up 41 points to Pennsylvania's 0 at Philadelphia. The Army walked over Maine university and the Navy won from Colby. Williams walloped Amherst, 14 to 6.

Brown showing against the Harvard substitutes was the most interesting battle. The first line of Crimson men were nearly all at Princeton, looking over their adversaries of next Saturday and the scrubs had their hands full holding the Brunonians. Coach Houghton sent Francke and Wilcox of his regular squad into the game during the last period in a vain effort to wrest a victory, but the Brown team held.

An attempt by Francke at a field goal failed. Gordon, of Brown, threw a scare into the Crimson rooters by a spectacular sixty yard run.

The Navy appeared slow in starting against Colby and the visitors rolled up 21 points before the Cadets' machine got to running smoothly. Then the full team was put in and things looked different.

**WISCONSIN FAILS TO MAKE GOOD**  
Dope Upset in Defeat of Wisconsin by Minnesota, 14 to 3—Forward Passes Big Factor.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 14.—Upsetting all dope, the Wisconsin eleven failed to make good today, losing to Minnesota, 14 to 3. Despite superior weight, the Badgers seemed unable to solve the mysteries of plays perfected by Doc Williams for the Gophers and lost repeatedly on forward passes. During the first session only had Wisconsin the best of it when they rushed the ball down to Minnesota's 21 yard line. Bellows drop kicked a goal, scoring 3.

With the opening of the second half, Minnesota came back strong. With a series of forward passes and plays through the line they carried the ball to Wisconsin's 25 yard line. A perfect forward pass to Boston resulted in a touchdown. Then Solon kicked goal.

In the third quarter Wisconsin resorted to the same open plays used by Illinois in defeating Minnesota, but the Gophers had perfected a defense and Wisconsin failed. With but a few minutes left to play, the Badgers attempted a forward pass which was intercepted by Bierman, who raced 76 yards for a touchdown. Solon again kicked goal. That ended the scoring.

**CATHOLICS REFEAT WILY RED SKINS**  
Notre Dame Burles Carlisle Under 48 to 6 Score in Game at Comiskey Park, Chicago.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—Men with names like Eichenlaub, Jones and Pilska out-tricked the wily redskins at Comiskey park this afternoon, and Notre Dame buried the Carlisle Indians under a 48 to 6 score.

Carlisle's one score came in the second period when Notre Dame fumbled on her 15 yard line. Full Back Callahan hit the Catholic line for 12 yards and then rushed over for a touchdown. Notre Dame took an early lead in the first period when Coffal dropped a goal from the 42 yard line. For the remainder of the game, Eichenlaub, Pilska and Jones roamed through redskin territory almost at will. Pilska contributed a 70 yard run for a touch down.

## NO UP-SETS IN EASTERN GAMES

Few Games of Importance Played in East Yesterday, and All Ended According to Advance Dope.

### HARVARD USED SUBS

Nearly All Crimson's First String Men Were Watching Yale-Princeton Game—Navy Was Scared.

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## ILLINOIS LOOKS TO WESTERN CROWN

Defeat of Chicago University by the Orange and Blue, Gives Them First Claim on Conference Title.

### EAST AND WEST SPLIT

Notre Dame Defeats Carlisle at Chicago While Cornell Trims Michigan—Nebraska Wins Again.

[By James O'Dea, written for the United Press.] CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—Hand the 1914 western conference crown to Illinois. The Orange and Blue eleven, booted about for years by other "big nine" universities, climaxed a season of brilliant successes at Champaign this afternoon, out-staged old Colonel Stagg and galloped through Chicago, last year's champions, winning 21 to 7. It was a most decisive victory. No sane man dreamed tonight that Wisconsin, humbled this afternoon by Minnesota, 14 to 3, can come back next Saturday and win from Illinois, thus tainting the Orange and Blue title. Illinois, it was reported tonight, will challenge the winner of the Harvard-Yale combat for a battle for the national championship, the proceeds to go to the Belgian relief fund.

East and west split the glory in the two inter-sectional battles in the middle west. Michigan's curtain rang down for the season on a tragedy for the Maize and Blue who bowed to Cornell 23 to 13. Notre Dame eyed the score for the west, walloping the Carlisle Indians, 48 to 6, at the White Sox baseball park in Chicago.

Nebraska offered another argument to support the claim that she has the best eleven west of the Alleghenies by mowing down Kansas, 35 to 0. Other western games of minor importance included Purdue's victory over the down-trodden Northwestern eleven by a score of 34 to 6, and the 39 to 0 beating handed Oberlin by Ohio State. The Illinois-Chicago game not only virtually ended the western conference fight but supplied some of the most spectacular figures seen on western gridiron grounds this year. Brilliant formations from Coach Zuppke's brain, upset the Chicago defense time and again. The stellar stunt came in the final period when Quarterback Clark caught Des Jardien's kickoff on his own five yard line and raced the length of the field for a touchdown.

**CHICAGO BRACES IN THIRD**  
Chicago braced in the third quarter but toward the end of the period the Zuppke scoring machine was working again. Pogue took the ball to the Maroon five yard line and on a quadruple pass Macomber went over and then kicked goal, tying the score. The Illini dashed into the lead five minutes after the final quarter opened. Des Jardien kicked outside on his own 24 yard line. Pogue circled an end for ten yards and Clark added ten more.

Rue, who replaced Schobinger, put the ball on the one yard line and after an unsuccessful try, Clark was finally hurled over for the second Illinois touchdown, Macomber kicking goal.

Clark's brilliant 95 yard dash for a touchdown then brought the stands up yelling. Receiving Des Jardien's kick off on his five yard line, the Illinois quarter shook off the Maroon tacklers by a wonderful burst of speed and placed the ball behind the goal post. Macomber kicked goal. Just before the game ended, Clark broke loose for another 40 yard run.

**MICHIGAN SETS UP RECORD FOR DEFEATS**  
For First Time in Fourteen Years—Yost Team Loses Three Games in One Year.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] ANN ARBOR, Mich., Nov. 14.—For the first time in the fourteen years that Fielding Yost has drilled the gridiron squads of the University of Michigan, the Wolverines have a record of three defeats in a single season. Only once before—in 1905—was a Yost team defeated twice in one year.

Cornell this afternoon added the finishing touches to a disastrous season for Michigan by defeating the Wolverines, 28 to 13. Despite the fact that Michigan scored 13 points before the easterners were able to chalk up a single count, Michigan never had a chance. When the big Red team finally found itself, as the second quarter was nearing its close, it romped through the Michigan defense with ease and the scoring ended only after the invaders had put over four touchdowns and had added three points to their total by a field goal. Barrett, Phillip, Collier and Schuyler plunged through the Michigan line for big gains, seemingly at will.

The open game gave Michigan her only points, both touchdowns coming in the first half, following long gains by forward passes.

**Carlisle Player Injured.**  
[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—Gus Welch, quarterback of the Carlisle Indians, suffered a broken cheek bone and apparent concussion of the brain in this afternoon's game with Notre Dame at the White Sox ball park. Welch was injured when he tackled Eichenlaub, the big Notre Dame fullback, as Eichenlaub crossed the line for the Catholic's third touchdown in the third period. Physicians at Mercy hospital tonight said that his condition was not dangerous.

## ILLINOIS TRIMS CHICAGO 21 TO 7

Maroons Clearly Outplayed by Down State Eleven in Battle for Western Conference Title.

### QUARTER BACK CLARK RAN LENGTH OF FIELD FOR TOUCHDOWN IN LAST QUARTER OF THE GAME.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Nov. 14.—Illinois took sweet revenge for frequent beatings at the hands of Stagg this afternoon, and coming from the rear with a whirl wind attack, defeated Chicago and won the western conference championship by the decisive score of 21 to 7.

The Maroons were clearly outplayed. The mighty Illini back field out-gained the up-staters nearly four to one. Des Jardien's wonderful punting was the only consolation which the Stagg crowd carried back tonight. Chicago's only touchdown came in the first quarter when the Maroons recovered one of Des Jardien's punts in the mid-field. Halfback Berger, who co-starred with Quarterback Russell for Chicago, got away for good gains and then swung around end for six yards and a touchdown. Shull kicked goal, putting the visitors in the lead 7 to 0.

**Gray Unable to Play.**  
Dolly Gray, crack Maroon back, who has been out of the game on account of injuries, was tried out in this period but thrown for a five yard loss and was evidently in bad shape. Schafer replaced him and it was evident almost at once that the Maroon backs were outclassed by the Orange and Blue.

Quarterback Clark, particular star of the Illini, with Pogue and Macomber, began speeding the ball toward the Maroon goal. On the seven yard line Chicago held, but the Orange and Blue came back. A fumble of a forward pass behind Chicago's goal line prevented an Illinois score.
