

# COOPER IS HERE; DOESN'T LIKE WAR

Keokuk Dam Builder Arrives in City This Morning From New York With Two Eastern Men.

## TO BE HERE TWO DAYS

Party Made Trip to Dam Right After Arrival—Engineer Says He is Enjoying Life.

Hugh L. Cooper is here, and he doesn't like the war. He said so this morning in conversation with a Gate City reporter in the lobby of the Hotel Iowa. Mr. Cooper arrived from New York on Number 12, accompanied by Harold Roberts and Joseph P. Day. The party will be here for a couple of days.

Engineer Cooper had very little to say this morning, but intimated that before he left he would have something to give out. He is looking the picture of health and declares that he is well and is having a good time. The war, however, is not relished by Mr. Cooper, according to his own statement.

"You can say that I'm well, that I'm having a good time and that I don't like this war," he stated in the interval between registering and giving orders to have his luggage taken to his room. "I expect to be here a couple of days."

It is understood that Mr. Cooper's visit here has to do with some tests which are to be made. The party left the hotel shortly before 10 o'clock and went to the plant. The entire plant will be visited, both the power house and the dam.

Mr. Cooper was met at the station this morning by Charles F. Wallace, vice president of the Mississippi River Power company. The party which went over the plant consisted of Mr. Cooper and the eastern men, H. T. Edgar, C. F. Wallace and H. E. Parsons who was with the mechanical engineering force during the construction work here, and is still with the Cooper interests, and who met Mr. Cooper here.

The cold winds which blew down Main street warned the members of the Cooper party that the temperature along the dam would not be as balmy as a day in June, and the stop at the hotel was made long enough to exchange derby hats for caps, and to take other precautions to defy the cold weather.

## SUFFRAGETTES ARE EXPECTING A DEBATE

Lively Controversy at Annual Convention Over Scope of Activities.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 16.—The exact scope of activities to be followed by the congressional committee of the National American Woman's Suffrage association, was expected to be defined before night when today's sessions began in the annual convention here. Delegates found themselves divided on the issues of state rights and the method of dealing with recalcitrant members of congress and a lively debate was in prospect.

One result of long and secret factional conferences yesterday came today with introduction of a resolution by Mrs. George W. Bass, of Chicago, designed to bring about a definite declaration of principles by the national organization. The resolution follows: "Be it resolved: That the National American Woman's Suffrage association be absolutely opposed to holding any political party responsible for the opinions and acts of its individual members, or holding any individual responsible for the majority action of its party on suffrage." to insist on a definite declaration against state organization work that is contrary to laws laid down by the national body. Such action, it was asserted, would bar state organizations that are dominated by the Congressional union, a suffrage organization now at odds with the national organization and whose policies have been openly directed against the democratic party.

## COUNCIL PASSES GARAGE ORDINANCE

Provides for the Construction of Fire Proof Garages as Protection to City Against Fire.

## MONTHLY INSPECTIONS

Chief of Fire Department to Make Monthly Inspections of Garage Buildings—No More Smoking.

The garage ordinance was passed by the city council today. It regulates the construction of all garages, the occupancy of buildings already built and now used as garages, prescribes the limits within which fireproof garages must be built, and within which other than fireproof garages may be built, and prescribes regulations for all buildings now or hereafter used for the storage or repair of automobiles.

The ordinance is designed to prevent the re-occurrence of such fires as destroyed the Gate City garage building and the water power garage building and the Water Power garage on either side of the two garages. The necessity of such an ordinance was pointed out immediately after the Water Power garage fire. The council has been working on the draft of the ordinance since that time.

The ordinance applies only to public garages and display or sales rooms, not connected with garages.

## Two Districts Outlined.

All garages constructed in the future must be fireproof if they are located within the district bounded by the east line of Water street, by Twelfth street on the west, by Blon-deau street on the north, and by Johnson street on the south from Seventh to Twelfth. In the remainder of the city, public and private garages may be built on plans and specifications approved by the city council, provided that none but fireproof garages be constructed where it exposes more than one other building to the fire hazard.

The ordinance says a fire proof garage must have walls constructed of brick or concrete, have concrete floor, roof with no sheeting exposed, metal lath if any lath is used, and have all doors, and window frames and sashes of metal. The garage must be heated by steam or hot water, and there must be no door or opening between the garage and the furnace room. If the building is over 115 feet long with an alley exposure, there shall be a wall in addition to the one nearest the alley fire wall 15 feet inside outside of the garage wall nearest the alley, with no opening except of fire proof construction.

All gasoline must be stored in underground tanks outside of the building.

## Provision for Old Garages.

All garages now constructed in which repair work is being done and with 500 square feet or more of floor space shall be made slow burning by the construction of repairs or improvements to be recommended by the city council. These garages are also subject to the other restrictions of the ordinance.

Owners of the garages are required to post "No Smoking" signs in their buildings and see that this regulation is strictly enforced. Boxes, containing three cubic feet of sand must be maintained for every 1,000 feet of floor space. All oil waste must be collected and removed daily. In addition to the sand boxes each work room, store room, or show room must be equipped with one or more three gallon fire extinguishers. Portable gas tanks must be equipped with rubber tires and have a hose of eight feet or more in length. All lights must be incandescent electric lights with the globes covered by a wire netting.


## Inspection by City Officers.

The ordinance provides for a monthly inspection of all garages by the chief of the fire department who shall make these inspections without previous notice to the owner or proprietor of the garage. He shall see that all the provisions of the ordinance are being complied with. The ordinance also states that it shall be the duty of the chief of police to enforce the provisions of the ordinance and prosecute all violators. The owner of the garage, however, is not relieved of the duty of seeing that all the provisions of the ordinance are complied with.

## BOTTOM OUT OF BUSINESS DEPRESSION

Six Thousand Men go Back to Work in the Steel Mills After Weeks of Idleness.

United Press Leased Wire Service. GARY, Ind., Nov. 16.—Six thousand men went back to work at the Gary steel mills today after an enforced idleness of several weeks. A general improvement of business in the steel industry, officials of the big corporation said, was responsible for the resumption. "The bottom has dropped out of the business depression in the United States," said an official of the steel company. "From now on we expect an upward trend in the business thermometer all over the nation."

The men who went back to work today were set at work in the steel mills, the tin-plate mills and the plant of the American Bridge Company, indicating general improvement. Small steel products for agricultural implement factories, steel and iron plates for ore steamers and many small jobs from the Pittsburgh mills are expected to come here while the eastern mills are turning out armor plate for the allies. Parts for automobiles also will be turned out at the plants which are now running at from sixty to seventy per cent of the normal capacity.

## RATE FIGHT MAY CUT PEANUT PRICE

Cheaper Goodies Promised Consumers if Commerce Counsel Can Secure Reduction Asked.

Peanuts will be cheaper in Keokuk and other Iowa cities if Dwight Lewis, assistant commerce counsel, is victorious in his effort to secure an order from the interstate commerce commission for a reduction of 20 per cent in the freight rate on this article from Virginia to Iowa points.
