### CHARGE IS FILED AGAINST MEXICAN

Mexican Who Cut Negro With Knife in Fight Saturday Night, Must Answer Serious Charge.

### STOLE ROBE FROM CAR

William Samuels Charged With Larceny of Lap Robe From Automobile—Fight at Hotel.

John Nare, the Mexican who is said to have engaged in a fight with George Bailey, colored, at A. A. Bland's shop, between Tenth and Eleventh on Main, Saturday night, was charged with assault with the intent to do great bodily injury, in an information filed against him in the superior court this morning by Chief John M. Kenney. As no trial can be given the defendant in the superior court, the defendant in the case probably will be bound over to await the action of the grand jury.

Although both Nare and Bailey were badly injured in the fight, neither was in a serious condition today. Bailey's left arm was almost severed from his body by a cut near his shoulder said to have been inflicted by Nare. Bailey is confined in bed at his home today. The Mexican's arm was broken in two places by a blow dealt him with a poker in the hands of Bailey. The fight resulted from a quarrel between the two regarding twenty-five cents Bailey claimed the Mexican owed him.

An information charging William Samuels with larceny was filed this morning in the superior court by Chief Kenney. Samuels is accused of taking a robe, valued at \$5, from an automobile standing in front of the fourth street entrance of the Hotel Iowa. The robe was the property of Hugh Robertson.

Paul Jobe, a bell boy at the Grand hotel, was charged with assault and battery in an information filed today by F. A. Rumbaugh, night clerk at the same hotel. Rumbaugh claims that Jobe assaulted him last night after he had ordered him to leave the building when Jobe refused to do some work that he had been ordered to attend to.

—Blom soap for sale by grocers. —Regular meeting of the Knights and Ladies of Security tonight at 8 o'clock, at Hawkes hall. —The coal dealers were popular today among those who left the job of provisioning the coal bin till the last minute. —Several experts have been in the vicinity of Keokuk examining cattle for evidences of the foot and mouth disease. —A new floor covering was being laid today in the office of John Leindecker, justice of the peace, and Henry F. Reichman, constable and deputy and fish warden. —Lee is among the nine counties in the state of Iowa in which the organization has been practically completed for making use of the services of a farm crop expert. There are eleven counties that have just recently decided to engage in this work. In the state there are forty counties that have taken up the crop agent plan. Linn is the latest to fall in line with this work, which has been successfully conducted here, so far as initial and preparatory plans are concerned. Agricultural interests are said to have been greatly benefited wherever an expert has been employed, resulting in an increase of products and improvement in quality. The system, which is rapidly extending over the whole of the land, is generally endorsed by those who are most competent to judge in such matters. —The store of Hume & Kerner at Wyaconda was entered in the early morning Friday and silk goods and clothing to the value of about \$250 taken.
