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## Arrest Her Husband.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] MURPHYSBORO, Ill., Nov. 19.—Following identification by L. D. Isaac of Thompsonville, Ill., a farmer, of the body of a woman recovered from the Big Muddy river a week ago as that of his daughter, Mrs. John Prichard of West Frankfort, Ill., Prichard, the husband, was arrested at Benton, Ill., and brought here pending an investigation of the woman's death. Isaac's identification was corroborated by his two sons and a Frankfort dentist who attended Mrs. Prichard's teeth, will be given opportunity to compare the fillings in the dead woman's teeth with records made for Mrs. Prichard. Mr. Prichard will be given a preliminary hearing this afternoon. The body was exhumed yesterday for the second time for the purpose of Isaac and his son to identify. Efforts to identify the body as that of Mrs. Ethel McDaniel failed. When found, the corpse revealed by receding waters of the Big Muddy river, was weighted down by a rock weighing sixty pounds. The head was swathed with a kimono. The condition of the body, an autopsy revealed, indicated that the woman had been in a delicate condition and had undergone an illegal operation.
