

LEE COUNTY HOME IS IN GOOD SHAPE

State Inspector Finds Everything in Good Condition and Has Praise for Steward Hart.

LIGHTING SYSTEM BAD

County Supervisors Considering Installation of New Lighting System—Local Home Ranks High.

That the Lee county home is one of the best in the state and that R. N. Hart, who has charge of it, is considered one of the most competent stewards in the state, was the statement made by H. H. McGee, inspector for the state board of control who made an inspection of the home today. Mr. McGee said the home was in the best kind of shape and that the inmates were being well cared for.

Mr. McGee made the recommendation to the county supervisors that a new lighting system be installed. In fact this recommendation was made by him on a previous visit. He said today that the local board had been giving the matter consideration and possibly would decide next week to install some sort of lighting system. It is probable that an electric lighting system will be used if the board decides to install one.

In speaking of the condition of the Lee county home Mr. McGee said that he was glad to find that the supervisors of this county took a real interest in the condition of the home. "In so many places," he said, "the local boards have adopted the attitude that the best way to manage the affairs of a county home is to do it as cheaply as possible. The cost should be a secondary consideration. We must take care of our unfortunate and efficiency in the method of caring for them should be the first thing considered. Of course, if handled efficiently, such an institution will be handled at the smallest cost that will secure the best results."

Daily Stock Letter.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—There were a number of developments calling for comment in the financial situation today. The indications pointed to an unusually large bank surplus being shown tomorrow as the result of the reduction of reserve requirement from taking off the new banking law; action by banks in different cities showed that the time was not far distant when all the clearing house loans collections as well as the emergency notes will be retired; more large balances were piled up in the banks of this city for the account of foreign interests and members of the cotton pool commission were in conference much of the day, touching on the best means of making the fund quickly available for the class of borrowers for whom it was intended. So far as the money market situation was concerned, the showing by several banks in deposits made here for foreign accounts. The accumulations have been going on for some time, but the total represented by the figures of the day was probably the largest ever held by the financial institutions of this city. Advances from abroad showed that bankers here would probably be given the opportunity soon to take more short term loans from foreign borrowers. There was a sharp advance in the price of exchange on Paris, otherwise the foreign exchange market showed little change.

So far as the cotton pool was concerned it was apparent that the subscriptions would be forthcoming soon and that within a few days the entire amount would be made available for southern interests.

Purdue Director Resigns.

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Nov. 20.—Hugh Nicol, veteran athletic director of Purdue, told his friends today he had decided to resign. This decision followed a thorough airing by the faculty of his charge that Coach Smith had forced his men to play such strenuous football that other conference teams "considered them rowdies." Andy Smith and Pete Vaughn have withdrawn their resignations.

Will Reduce Rates.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—That the federal reserve board probably will reduce discount rates of several reserve banks next week, was indicated at the treasury today. The changes will occur after the reserve payments of the Dallas and San Francisco district banks are completed. Reducing to date has been comparatively small, but the normal level is expected with the change of rates.

He Has It.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Nov. 20.—Physicians today investigated the case of Paul F. Tressler, Montpelier, Ohio, state university student of agriculture thought afflicted with foot and mouth disease.

Tressler had been sampling as many as fifteen grades of cream in his department daily for weeks, some of which it is now learned, came from a herd of infected cattle. He suffers severely.

For High Treason.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., Nov. 20.—Facing a possible penalty of death for alleged high treason, Robey Sayer of the Canadian Soo was held in jail here today by military authorities. He is charged with smuggling Austrian reservists across the St. Marys river from Canada to Michigan soil.

The local officials are awaiting word from Ottawa as to what disposition will be made of the case.

Lodge Wants to Fight.

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 20.—Bitter condemnation of the administration's course in the Tennessee incident was voiced by Senator Lodge of Massachusetts at the Middlesex club dinner last night, according to details which leaked out today. Lodge was quoted as saying that "within three days after the Tampico incident, which was comparable to the Tennessee matter, there was shedding of blood."

"Think of the furry and excitement at Mexico's insult and the meekness and mildness with which the administration is considering the Turkish incident," the senator concluded.

Bresnahan in Charge.

CHICAGO, Nov. 20.—Roger Bresnahan, new Cub manager, took the desk at the club office vacated by Hank O'Day today and after sorting the mail of the morning, modestly picked the Cubs to win the pennant in 1915.

"Rajah" admitted that enroute to the club house, he side tracked a few players.

The whole people could declare war in thirty days, it is claimed and in case of invasion the power of declaring war would remain with congress.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Nov. 20.—Nate Lewis, manager for Charley White, today cancelled White's scheduled ten round bout at Milwaukee with Johnny Kilbane on November 30. Lewis gave no good excuse, according to Kilbane's manager.

Murderers Are Caught.

HUMBOLDT, Iowa, Nov. 20.—Olyde Spiker, 20, of Minneapolis and Ray James, of Houston, Texas, are under arrest here and officers say they confessed to murdering Conductor Reynolds, of Eagle Grove, on a North-western freight train Wednesday night. They had just secured employment here when arrested. They say they tried to hold up the conductor and passengers and did not intend to kill the conductor, but he showed fight.

Mayor Receives Message Requesting Him to Interest all Pastors of City in Matter of Relief Collections.

ANNOUNCE IT SUNDAY

Thanksgiving Day Offerings Will be Acceptable According to This Dispatch and May be Given.

The Belgian relief committee wants Thanksgiving day offerings from the churches. Mayor Moorhead received a telegram from F. J. Kuhlmeier of Burlington today, in which the chairman of the Belgian relief committee asks that the mayor notify all of the ministers of the city to this effect.

The dispatch received today reads as follows: "The Belgian relief association of Iowa under the appointment of Governor Clarke is appealing to the people for cash donations. Kindly interest every minister regardless of creed, and have him announce from the pulpit on Sunday that the Thanksgiving offerings would be acceptable. Send collections to W. C. Brown at Des Moines, and corn donations will be received at the elevators."

Keokuk ministers will be asked to take some action in this matter next Sunday, and there is little doubt but that the Thanksgiving offering which will be taken at the union services can be devoted to this cause.

The committee will not send the money out of the state. It will be used for the purchase of corn.

BLAME HEADLIGHTS FOR WILEY'S DEATH

Automobile Standing Still and Light from Train Believed to Have Confused Him.

That a confusion of headlights on an automobile and the train which had just come into sight around a curve caused George Wylie to become confused and drive on the Wabash track is the theory advanced by Carthage people. The Carthage Republican says:

George Wylie, returning home from Keokuk Saturday evening with a mule team and wagon of empty chicken coops, was struck at the crossing just west of Elvaston by the west bound Wabash passenger train and was instantly killed. Both mules were also killed and wagon and contents wrecked. George Wylie was the last of four team outfits coming home from Keokuk from delivering chickens for Roy Weaver. Mr. Weaver in a buggy was right behind Wylie as they approached the crossing. He saw the train coming and supposed Wylie was waiting for the train to pass. The next thing he saw was Wylie's outfit go up in the air at the impact from the engine.

There was an automobile near the crossing waiting for the train and as the light from the train headlight does not shine on the crossing until the train swings around a slight curve, Wylie must have become confused and did not realize where he was. The train was going rapidly and quick action would have been difficult even by a cool headed resourceful driver.

Cause of Editor's Death.

PEORIA, Ill., Nov. 20.—Injuries he received in a fight with Attorney Giles Keithley probably caused the fatal illness of Editor E. F. Baldwin, according to Dr. Frank E. Baldwin, son of the decedent, who testified today at the inquest. The witness said his father told him Keithley kicked him in the side and at the base of the spine while he was on the ground. County Physician W. L. Houghland declared that Baldwin died of uraemic poisoning and a septic condition of the kidney. He said the disease of the kidneys might have been of recent development or might have been of long standing.

The inquest was adjourned until tomorrow morning, when other physicians will give opinion as to the alleged connection of the assault with the editor's death.
