Will Conduct Union Service of Protestant Churches—Day's Program Will be Varied One.

Keokuk, grateful for all its benefits of the year, will tomorrow, observe Thanksgiving day. The day will be observed individually and collectively. There will be church services in the morning and evening, family dinners and reunions will form a pleasant social feature of the day, and during the afternoon and evening there will be plenty in the way of recreation. Union services in the church will be held tomorrow morning at 10:30 o'clock in the First Congregational church. The Rev. William H. In the Catholic churches also there will be services. For the afternoon there is a varied program to choose from, football, and auto races furnishing the principal events on this calendar.

In the evening the theaters, charity ball and various other entertainments will help bring the day of thanksgiving to a close.
