

### SMELTER WORKS PLANS ENLARGED

Company Considering Larger and More Permanent Plant Than Was Planned at First.

### WANT STREET VACATED

Company Asks City to Vacate Part of Commercial Street Between N and M Streets.

That the Johnson Smelter works permanently will put up a larger and more permanent plant than was first planned was the belief expressed today of a city official.

Representatives of the company recently made the request of the city council that they vacate for a period of three years that part of Commercial street between M and N streets.

Commercial street between M and N, that section the smelter works seeks to have vacated, has never been opened and there are at present some buildings in a part of this street.

If the street is vacated permanently the smelter works will then feel secure in erecting a permanent brick building on this site, a part of which would extend upon the street.

It is probable the request of the company will be granted by the city council. Although no action had been taken by the council, that body had decided upon vacating the street for a period of three years, as first asked by the company.

The council very likely will decide to vacate the street permanently, according to the request of the company, a member of the council said this afternoon.

### R. J. REYNOLDS DIED THANKSGIVING DAY

Had Been a Respected Resident of Keokuk, Ever Since His Boyhood.

Robert J. Reynolds, a well known and respected resident of Keokuk for a number of years, died at his home, 1712 St. Charles street, yesterday, after a continuous residence here of nearly forty-five years, except probably an absence of about a year.

Mr. Reynolds was born at Sidney, Ohio, January 3, 1858, and at the time of his lamented death was fifty-six years, nine months and twenty-six days of age. He came to Keokuk in the spring of 1873.

His first marriage occurred when he was united with Miss Emma Lovins, who died December 21, 1900, and in 1905 was united in marriage with Mrs. Elizabeth Vermillion who survives him. He is also survived by three sons, Frank E. Reynolds and John Vermillion, both of Keokuk and A. W. Reynolds of Des Moines. He is also survived by three brothers, John Reynolds of Mt. Pleasant, Utah, and Silas A. and Charles Reynolds of this city.

Mr. Reynolds was for a number of years with the S. P. Pong company and was for ten years a faithful and trusted member of the Keokuk fire department and was always prompt and active in the discharge of his duties whether in the line of his business calling or with the fire department. No fireman connected with the force was more quiet and active than he.

He was prominent in his habits, firm in his attachments to friends of whom he had many in Keokuk and elsewhere, where he was known and his death causes universal regret in this vicinity. He was a good husband, a kind father, a firm friend, a valued neighbor and an excellent citizen, who drew friends about him without effort who valued him for his real worth as a man and an exemplary citizen.

### AMERICA COURTING WARRING INTERESTS

Rev. Ernst Likens Our Neutrality to Holiness of Israelites in Sermon Preached Yesterday.

Thanksgiving services were held in the German Evangelical church yesterday at 10:30 a. m. Rev. A. C. Ernst preached to a large and appreciative congregation. He pointed out that there were unusual causes for a national Thanksgiving day this year, in consideration of the world conflict.

He said in part: "Thanksgiving to us this year is the celebration of a 'passover.' Our neutrality is a neutrality in degree only. Like the holiness of the Israelites in Canaan, who for the sake of pity and with the object of gain, permitted heathen interests among them and maintained relations foreign to God's purpose. So America naturally separated from the danger-zone of war, under pretense of the highest type of moral neutrality, is courting the interests of conflicting nations and is thereby in danger of forfeiting our God-given natural and geographical protection."

"The Thanksgiving day if it shall be in thanksgiving a national Thanksgiving day, pre-supposes first, welfare of all classes; second, a predominant religious significance of the day, and third, a charitable disposition put into practice." The total offering for the German and Belgian Red Cross amounted to \$105.00, which will be delivered in full without discount for exchange or carriage.

### GEORGE WEBER DIED EARLY THIS MORNING

At His Home in the Vicinity of Charleston, Where He Had Lived Respected Life.

George Weber, an old and highly respected citizen of Charleston, this county, died at 1:30 o'clock this morning, of dropsy, after an illness of about two weeks.

Mr. Weber was born November 7, 1833, in Alsace, Germany. He came to this country with his parents in 1845 when about twelve years of age. He was a prominent farmer in the vicinity of Charleston for many years, with a wide acquaintance, and was popular in a large circle of friends and neighbors. He was a consistent member of the German Evangelical church.

Mr. Weber was twice married, both of his wives preceding him in death. He is survived by two sons and two daughters, George and Fred Weber, and Mrs. Kate Wahrer and Mrs. Lena Hopp.

resign unless Governor Hunt repeals the eleven murderers condemned to hang on the same gallows on December 19. Simms declares he will not under any circumstances consent to be the executioner of the eleven men under a plan for a "wholesale hanging bee."

Under pressure of petitions, personal pleas and adverse comment by the press, the governor is apparently wavering in his determination to order the hangings. It will be necessary for him to reprieve the men, however, further, if the affair is to be prevented.

Warden Simms declares he will not permit anybody to interview the condemned men.
