EFFECTIVE TOMORROW

Schedules A and B become of force December 1 and dealers are preparing to obey law.

Deputy Collector of Internal Revenue L. J. Wolf was busy today supplying the needs of the public in the matter of the new revenue stamps required on articles which are included in schedules A and B, which become effective tomorrow.

Documentary stamps will be placed on certain documents which are filed for record after tomorrow. The law makes it unlawful to record any which are included in the agreement unless the full amount of stamps is affixed.

Dr. Jean Turner Zimmerman is Superintendent of Woman's Shelter which is conducted in Chicago.


IS PROVING OF BENEFIT

HOME ORPHANAGE REPORT RECEIVED

Many Homeless Children Have Been Saved and Homes Have Been Found for Numerous Others in Year.

NEED MONEY FOR WORK

Will be Necessary to Close Some Departments if Contributions Are Not Sent in at Once.

A report from the Christian Home Orphanage, Council Bluffs, Iowa, covering the time from September 1, 1914 to November 1, 1914, says: We have received seventy-eight children and twelve mothers, and homes have been found for thirty-nine with splendid private families.

Forty-one children were returned during this period to parents or other relatives who furnished affidavits that they were now in position to properly care for them.

Eight mothers with twelve children were located in positions where they will henceforth attempt to be self-supporting.

Seventeen children and two mothers were returned to the home during this period, who had, previous to the time of this report, been placed out by us.

Letter from Bellinger. IOWA'S COURT BILL FOR YEAR IS LARGE

It Cost Nearly Half Million to Keep Judicial Machine Going, According to Report Made.

The state of Iowa spent \$461,906.77 during the year ending July 1, 1914, in maintaining courts and handling crime. In addition, the ninety-nine counties paid \$112,051.41 in salaries to county attorneys and \$21,064.39 in salaries to assistant county attorneys.

For the year ending July 1, 1913, the state paid \$503,005.21 in handling crime, according to the reports filed Saturday with the governor by the state board of parole. Apparently there was a reduction in the cost of handling crime in Iowa, but the members of the board believe that this is not true.

The state board says that this apparent reduction is accounted for by the fact that the record for the year ending July 1, 1913, includes many items which should have been left out.

"Very few are able to form any idea of the physical and mental strain such a work entails upon them. It is constant and confining.

"When to these burdens must be added the crushing and discouraging burden of light receipts, the load becomes more than one should be called upon to assume.

"During the past few years the work has grown to such great proportions that Mr. Lemen's strength has been taxed to the utmost, and for the past two years he has been failing. I have advised him to seek prolonged rest, but this, he says, is impossible.

"This has aggravated an old trouble to such an extent that an operation is deemed necessary, and I have so advised him.

"He states that such a thing is out of the question at this time of the year, as he must be at the office during the Thanksgiving offering.

"I am writing this letter to friends of the Home to urge them to make an earnest effort to clear the Home of debt at Thanksgiving.

"Mr. Lemen needs rest, and must undergo an operation. He refuses to do either while the Home is in this condition.

"I consider it a time when all friends of the work should gather around him and give the Home a rousing offering at Thanksgiving.

"The least we can do now is to provide sufficient means with which to properly conduct the work.

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"Let us make the coming annual Thanksgiving offering a cheerful one.
