MRS. HARRIMAN HURRYING WESTWARD

Leaves Grave of Her Husband to go to Colorado and Sit on Industrial Board.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] DENVER, Colo., Dec. 5.—From the grave of her husband, the millionaire New York broker and banker, who died a week ago, Mrs. J. Borden Harriman, is hurrying to Denver to participate in the investigation of the Colorado coal strike now being conducted here by the United States commission of industrial relations. Chairman Frank P. Walsh announced tonight that Mrs. Harriman had left Washington and would arrive here Monday morning. She is the only woman member of the commission.

The entire day was devoted by the commission to examination of Jesse F. Welborn, president of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Co., one of the "big three" operators who control the coal situation in southern Colorado. He was required to discuss in detail the activities of his company during a period covering many years. The probes laid particular stress on a pamphlet entitled "The Truth About the Struggle for Industrial Freedom in Colorado." It was prepared by the operators and mailed to 40,000 prominent clergymen, statesmen, publicists and merchants in all parts of the country.

Witness admitted he thought some of the statements in the pamphlet were not susceptible of proof, though he personally believed them. He was asked about statements in the pamphlet that Frank J. Hayes, John Lawson, "Mother" Mary Jones and other United Miners' leaders drew salaries of from \$42 to \$90 a day from the union treasury during a period of nine weeks. Welborn said he got the figures from a Pueblo newspaper and had permitted their publication because he had never heard them denied.

Witness contended that the admission of miners' officials that they paid \$3,000,000 in strike benefits in Colorado, showed they had paid the strikers at the rate of about \$1,000 a year apiece as there were never more than 4,650 men who "responded to the strike call."

Discussing the strike itself, Welborn said his company had purchased between \$25,000 and \$30,000 worth of arms and ammunition during the entire strike period.

He declared that on a total capitalization of \$36,000,000 his company had eleven years had paid only \$960,960 in dividends, so small an amount that he holds it practically impossible to raise wages. He charged that Ethelbert Stewart and Secretary Wilson were unfair.

CARRANZA IS GREATLY FEARED

It is Said That He Intends to Destroy British Property Before Fleeing.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Carranza's attitude toward foreigners and foreign interests was giving the administration some anxiety tonight.

Simultaneously with reports that he is going to Salina Cruz in the near future, came protests from British sources saying that he and his chief lieutenants at Vera Cruz are threatening British interests. According to Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, the British ambassador, Carranza has let it be known that before he and his followers abandon Vera Cruz they will destroy British property there. The suggestion is made that they will do so in the hope of bringing about complications between the United States and Great Britain. There is nothing that the United States could do at this time to prevent such action. While there are still two battleships and a gunboat in Vera Cruz harbor, they could
