OLD FASHIONED LOVE IS BEST

Eugenics is Given Knockout Blow by the Women's Congress of Illinois.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, Dec. 12.—Old fashioned love matches won out over the theory of scientific mating by eugenics in a turbulent discussion that brought the first executive congress of Illinois women to a close in the Congress hotel this afternoon. The plea of Mrs. Lydia Avery Coonley Ward, an aged social worker, to "let the boys and girls make love and marry as they used to when I was a girl," swayed the clubwomen delegates more than did the arguments of Dr. Lucy Waite, prominent surgeon, and other women speakers who demanded health certificates for both young men and girls before marriage.

A resolution to indorse a proposed bill modeled after the Wisconsin law, was tabled by an overwhelming vote.

Several women favored a law demanding from prospective grooms health certificates showing they were free from disease, but they objected to medical examinations for their daughters on the ground that it would cause them too much embarrassment. It was agreed that a law requiring a health certificate from one party to a marriage contract and not from the other would be absurd and the resolution was tabled.

Resolutions endorsing the eight hour working day for women, the minimum

wage law for women and the recall were adopted. Miss Jane Addams, Lieutenant Governor Barratt O'Hara and Miss Gertrude Barnes, special agent of the federal commission on industrial relations, were speakers at the closing session.

Three Years in Pen.
MILWAUKEE, Wis., Dec. 12.—Ralph Bowman, 20, of Akron, Ohio, and Millard Davenport, 21, of Toledo, this afternoon, were sentenced to three years in the Green Bay reformatory for assaulting and robbing Mrs. Fannie Dorris, of this city, of \$1,275 in jewelry. Irene Reddington, 20, alias Irene Baker, also of Toledo, and an alleged accomplice, became so hysterical while on the witness stand that her own trial was adjourned until Monday.

Great American Armada.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—The most formidable armada ever assembled under the American flag will be seen at the naval station at Guantanamo in January. Secretary of the Navy Daniels announced tonight he had issued orders for concentrating the Atlantic fleet there on January 15 for maneuvers. The fleet will be composed of twenty-one battleships, nine of them the most powerful type of superdreadnaughts. The two latest monsters of the navy, the Texas and the New York will be among them.

Admiral Fletcher, recently appointed commander of the Atlantic fleet, will leave New York between January 10 and 15 for Guantanamo to direct the maneuvers.

The vessels will be stationed at Guantanamo until ready to start through the canal to the Panama-Pacific exposition as escort to President Wilson, the congressional and official party.

Steamer is Overdue.
NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—The steamer Floride of the French line, which left Havre November 24, is now several days overdue here and some anxiety is felt concerning her. Officers of the steamship line say she may have had to put in at the Azores because of rough weather. The Floride carried twenty-four second class and fifteen steerage passengers.
