

CHAS. HUBENTHAL DIED LAST NIGHT

At His Home in the Suburbs of the City, on the Plank Road and the Boulevard.

WAS BORN IN GERMANY

Had Been in This Country for Many Years and Came to Keokuk When It Was a Village.

Charles Hubenthal, an old and esteemed citizen of Keokuk died at his home in the suburbs of the city, on the Plank road and the boulevard, in the settlement known as Messengersville. His death occurred at 12:30 o'clock last night, after an illness of several months of dropsy and complications.

Mr. Hubenthal was born in the town of Amer Kantungen, Hesse Cassen, Germany, June 25, 1833. His father, Valentine Hubenthal was a carpenter and cabinet maker by trade and spent his entire life in Germany.

The deceased attended the public schools in his native country until thirteen and a half years old, and then began to learn the butcher's trade, which he followed both in Germany and the United States. When quite young he was left an orphan by the death of his parents.

On coming to this country he first settled with an uncle at Natchez, Miss. His uncle and aunt died of yellow fever and he remained for a year when he went to Pittsburg, Penn. From there he went to St. Louis. He came to Keokuk in 1853, and as he said he found a little struggling village. His financial condition made it imperative that he find immediate employment and for some time he worked for others, but afterwards embarked in business on his own account and was generally successful.

Went to California. When the war broke out he went to California, that golden Eldorado of the early days. On his trip to the far west he was shipwrecked on a fruit ship after crossing the isthmus of Panama, being a passenger, on the fruit ship, but was picked up by the steamer Golden Gate, on which steamer he continued his trip to San Francisco. He secured employment there at his trade. He lived on the coast for about seven years and eight months, during which time he visited several states and crossed the plains five times. He met all the usual experiences and hardships incident to travel through the American desert and mountain passes and could relate many incidents of the perils of the day. He went from Salt Lake City to Montana where he prospected for gold for a time. On this trip he took a train load of flour and other supplies destined for Virginia City. A terrible blizzard came on the Banrock mountains and snow fell to a great depth, the storm raging for forty-eight hours. Mr. Hubenthal lost all his flour, which would have brought him \$336,000, and the teamster lost thirty-two oxen.

Nothing daunted at his loss he made his way back to Salt Lake City, with a courage which would not yield to defeat. At that city, with youthful health and vigor, he joined Major Bradley, afterwards governor of Nevada and went to Lower California, and he engaged in the butchering business in several points in Nevada. In connection with partners he located and partially developed a silver

mine, without, however, giving up the butchering business which he continued in connection with the mining business.

Returned to Keokuk. In 1870 Mr. Hubenthal returned to Keokuk which has since been his home and for an extended period was connected with the butchering business which proved very prosperous. On October 9, 1856, he was married to Miss Anna Arnold, a native of Wurtemberg, Germany, who passed away November 22, 1908. It is said of him that, "he has never had occasion to regret his determination to try his fortune in the new world, for here he has found the opportunities which he sought and through their improvement has at length reached a position among the men of affluence in Keokuk."

Probably there was no man in Keokuk or Lee county better and more favorably known than Charlie Hubenthal. Always genial, optimistic and full of jolly humor, he was generally the life of every company in which he happened to be.

He took a deep interest in the early politics of the county and was always present at county conventions of his party and frequently attended district and state conventions. He represented the fifth ward in the city council in the years of 1873, 1874, 1875, 1876 and was always energetic, prompt and attentive to his official duties. Several times he was mentioned for the office of sheriff of the county, but failed to receive the nomination from his party for that office. He, however, served a term as deputy sheriff several years ago. His health began to fail and age began to leave its imprint upon him and a very serious accident happened to him a few years ago. These took away his native vigor and since last fall he has been kept at home with the illness which has at last proved fatal. He had hosts of friends in Keokuk and all over the county who will be sincerely saddened by his death. He was a jovial, whole-souled citizen, a leader in local affairs. A member of St. Paul's German Evangelical church, his genial presence and christian liberality will be missed in that organization. A good man is no more.

Mr. Hubenthal is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Paul Landke of this city; also by one brother, Frederick Hubenthal of Pittsburg, Penn., and one sister in Germany, and one grandchild.

SAYS PFANSCHMIDT WAS NOT GUILTY

Defense Introduces Experts, Who Hold That Unskilled Boy Could Not Have Cut Bodies as They Were.

ABOUT THE BLOOD SPOTS

Defense Experts Say That Spots on Clothes Couldn't Have Been on More Than Two Days.

PRINCETON, Ill., Feb. 11.—Counsel for the defense in the Ray Pfanschmidt murder trial yesterday introduced evidence to show that, according to its theory, the crime in Adams county could not possibly have been committed by the prisoner if he returned to his grading camp on Friday night by 3 o'clock as shown by the prosecution and that the clothes found in the outhouse at the Freese premises were "blanted" by those directly interested in the conviction of the youth.

Dr. F. Robert Ziet, who testified at the first trial and who is at the head of the school of pathology at Northwestern University, and Drs. C. D. Center and Thomas B. Knox of Quincy furnished the testimony which sustained the foregoing contention by the defense.

Dr. Ziet said he occupied the same chair in Northwestern University with Dr. Hektoen in Chicago University. He also said he had taught doctors and post graduates in the science of pathology for seventeen years and was head pathologist at Mercy, Wesley and other hospitals of Chicago. He testified that he had graduated from American colleges in medicine and most of his preliminary studying was done in northern Germany.

His evidence on direct examination by Attorney Lancaster for the defense in part was as follows: "I am familiar with blood, the color and the time it takes the color to change from a purplish red to brown. Found Nine Days After Murder.

Dr. Ericson and Dr. Center previously testified that when they saw the clothes in the basement of the county jail shortly after they had been removed from the vault, the spots of blood on them were still of a purplish red. The evidence shows that the clothes were found nine days after the murder and the blood spots had not as yet turned.

Says Saw Was Used. Dr. Charles Center testified that he examined the bodies in the ruins when he conducted an autopsy together with Dr. Ericson and Dr. Knox and he described the body of the defendant's father as having the thighs, legs, arm and head severed. He said that in his opinion the things from the appearance of the flesh around the bone and the bone itself, had been severed from the body with a sharp instrument and cut with a saw.

The doctor testified that burning could not have produced such a condition. He said on direct examination in answer to questions by Attorney Lancaster that the unskilled boy, 20 or 25 years old could not cut the body of Charles Pfanschmidt to pieces as it was found in the ruins and burn the parts in a cook stove with an ordinary fire box and destroy them in less than eight hours.

The witness said he was basing his answer on his own experience with burning human flesh and his ability to cut up or saw up a body. He said that gasoline alone could not destroy a body, unless the applications were repeated, in under eight hours.

President Cornell denied that the three actresses wore scant clothes or kissed bald headed guests.

WENT CRAZY IN HOSPITAL

Man Who Watched His Wife Dying, Began Shooting With Revolver. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] DENVER, Colo., Feb. 11.—Sister Libria, a nun, was shot and painfully wounded and a patient and two attendants were fired upon when Frank Rosso, 42, suddenly crazed by grief, whipped out a revolver while standing by the bedside of his dying wife in St. Anthony's hospital. Rosso is confined in the observation ward of the county hospital today. His wife died early this morning, within a few hours after her husband had attempted to take the life of the nun who had just assisted in administering the last rites of the Catholic church to her.

Father Piccolli and Sister Libria had just completed the solemn service with Rosso standing by when he opened fire. The first bullet struck Sister Libria. Rosso then fired upon a woman patient occupying a bed in the same ward with his wife. The shot went wild and he dashed from the room, meeting two hospital internes in the hall. Rosso fired three shots at them, but all missed. He was then overpowered and placed in a padded cell until removed to the county hospital.

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DETERMINED TO PUSH THE BILL

President Wilcox Will Consent to no Compromise in Ship Purchase Bill Fight. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—After a two hours conference with Senators Fletcher and Simmons and Representative Kitchen, President Wilson decided to consent to no compromise in his ship purchase bill fight. It was stated on highest authority today. The administration's determination to fight the ship purchase bill to a finish, side-tracks yesterday's proposals to tack the measure to the Weeks bill, or to substitute the Gore bill for it. The president's talks with the democratic house and senate leaders, convinced him nothing could be gained by such flank movements. Senators Fletcher and Simmons declined to discuss their meeting with the executive. They hurried from the white house to the capitol to confer with their colleagues and lay new lines of defense.

The president today plainly indicated to congressional callers that unless the filibuster was beaten, he certainly would call an extra session.

PROHIBITION FOR IOWA IN 1920

Proposition by Senator Farr to Have Provision in Prohibitory Amendment Fixing the Date of Effect Far Off.

URGES JUSTICE TO ALL

Cities Would Need Time to Readjust Their Tax Levies and Financial Affairs if Saloons Go Out of Business.

DES MOINES, Feb. 11.—Senator E. P. Farr of Sioux City at the meeting of the senate committee on constitutional amendments this afternoon will use his efforts to have incorporated in the prohibitory amendment a provision fixing January 1, 1920, as the time the measure will take effect, if passed. He declares that the dry forces in order to be fair to the men in the liquor business and to permit cities to adjust their tax levies and financial affairs to meet the loss of the saloon tax should give a reasonable time for the closing out of the liquor business and that the end shall be definitely fixed.

According to the Wilson resolution adopted Tuesday the committee is compelled to report the prohibitory amendment out today, in some shape or other. It is said that there will be other amendments offered to the measure in addition to the one fixing the time.

Offers Explanation. As an explanation of his position on the question of determining when the amendment shall be effective, Senator Farr has prepared the following statement for the committee: "Under the law, the thirty-seventh general assembly has the power of fixing the time when the popular election shall be held ratifying the proposed amendment. As the resolution now stands, without the time limit amendment, the constitutional amendment would go into effect as soon as the vote is canvassed and insofar as the legislature shall enact laws providing for its enforcement, the amendment would be effective only in annulling contracts, and would prevent the enforcing of any licenses by a city, or enforcing any contracts relative to intoxicating liquors, but it would not prevent bootlegging.

Would Give Cities Chance. "The object of fixing the time is, so that cities whose revenue shall be largely affected by the closing of the saloons may provide for revenue from other sources. For instance, Sioux City derives a revenue of \$80,800 per year from saloons. That revenue must be obtained from other sources, and the city government should have a reasonable time in which to make arrangements for such revenue.

"Moreover, in most cities where the liquor traffic is now carried on, there are many people employed in the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors. These persons would be thrown out of employment, and they should know, and their employers should know at as early a date as possible when the proposed amendment will probably go into effect."
