Largest Well in World. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, Feb. 13.—The largest well in the world was completed at the stock yards today. It is 1,625 feet deep, has a diameter of 16 1/2 inches at the bottom and flows 3,000,000 gallons of water a day. It cost \$50,000. The well will flow 7,000,000 gallons of water, when a supplementary bore is completed.

OLD RESIDENT DIED LAST NIGHT

John M. Pigg, 76, For Thirty Years a Resident of This City, Answered Summons Last Night.

NATIVE OF KENTUCKY

Came to This Community at an Early Age—Was An Honored and Respected Citizen.

John M. Pigg, seventy-six years old, a native of Jefferson county, Kentucky, and for nearly thirty years an honored and respected citizen of this community, died at 8:55 last night at his home, 2216 Des Moines street. His death was caused by a complication of diseases with which he had been confined to his bed for several weeks. He had not enjoyed good health for about two years.

The deceased was a carpenter by trade and had followed that pursuit the greater part of his life. In his work he was conscientious as well as industrious. He exercised his principles of character in his work and in his every day life, and it was this trait that caused him to become so highly regarded by those who knew him.

Among other structures on which he worked, seven of the depots on the Keokuk and Western railroad were built under his supervision.

The deceased came to this section at the age of twelve when his parents moved from Kentucky to Camp Point, Illinois, bringing him with them. Several years later he moved to Hancock county and was situated not far from Hamilton. It was while living at this place that he became acquainted with Clara M. Randall, to whom he was married at Carthage in 1866. In 1880 he moved to Clark county, Missouri, and from that place came here six years later. He had made his residence in this city since that time. He served eight months in the civil war, being a member of Company C, 118 Illinois volunteers. He had been a member of Torrence post, G. A. R., for many years. He was reared in the Methodist church.

Three children, twenty grandchildren, and one great-grandchild survive him. His children are: Mrs. Francis C. Hight, McDonald, Kansas; Mrs. F. L. Hughes, Luray, Missouri; and G. W. Randall, of this city. One brother, Samuel N. Pigg, of Clarksville, Mo., also survive him.
