

LITTLE WRECK ON NORTH ROAD

Two Cars Jumped Track at Johnson Street Road Crossing When Train Was Coming In.

WRECKER IS SENT FOR

Location of Trouble in Hollow at Foot of Grade, Makes Service of This Crew Necessary.

Two freight cars on train No. 50 of the Mount Pleasant branch of the Burlington jumped the track at the Johnson street road crossing this morning, while the train was on its way from Mount Pleasant to Keokuk. This is the regular train and is due to arrive here at 11:45 o'clock. No one was hurt in the accident.

One of the cars jumped the track at the crossing. The sudden stopping of the train caused the bar behind this one, also to go off. The location of the accident, at the foot of a slight grade is such that it was necessary to send to Hannibal for a wrecker. The engine was cut off from the train and came to Keokuk to bring a coach out to the scene so passengers and baggage could be transferred. This was done and the passengers brought to the station with but little delay.

The wrecking crew arrived from Hannibal this afternoon and immediately began to clear the track. The regular train which leaves Keokuk at 2:30 o'clock was made up and sent out as usual.

There was no session of district court today, as Judge W. S. Hamilton did not arrive from Fort Madison this afternoon.

DENTAL SUPPLY COMPANY TO MOVE

Manager of Patterson-O'Brien Company Admits Will Vacate Offices at End of Month.

SALESMEN CALLED IN

Rumored That Branch Here Will be Closed Tonight and Move to Kansas City.

Rumors that the Patterson-O'Brien company, manufacturers of dental supplies, will close their local branch was given foundation today when Harry J. Russell, manager of the branch, admitted that the company would vacate their new offices in the Masonic temple the thirty-first of the present month. The rumor was further substantiated when the traveling salesman of this office were ordered to return from the road at once.

When Manager Russell discovered he was talking to a newspaper reporter, after admitting the company would move their offices at the end of this month, he refused to say anything more. He stated there might be something for publication later, but said there was nothing to give out now.

It was reported today that the offices here would be closed this evening, but that the fixtures would not be moved until the end of the present month when the lease of this company is said to expire. The fact that the traveling salesman were called in today seems to substantiate this report that the office would be closed at once.

It is understood that Mr. Patterson, one of the owners of the company, has gained control of the company and is consolidating the branches at Kansas City. The branch at St. Louis and another in Mr. O'Brien's home town are said to have been closed by him.

It is not known whether or not the local men employed by this company will be retained if the branch here is closed. There are a number of Keokuk men connected with this branch either in the office here or on the road.
