## ANOTHER GUNBOAT GOES TO BOTTOM

Jack Dillon Puts Indianapolis on the Fight Map by Winning Decision From Gunboat Smith.

## FANS SEE REAL ACTION

It Was a Pretty Fight From the Opening Gong, With a Whirlwind Finish in the Tenth.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., March 17.—Indianapolis is on the pugilistic map today. Jack Dillon, native son, put it there when he treated Gunboat Smith to a nasty licking in ten rounds at the Auditorium last night. Jack didn't exactly sink the ship, but he muscled it up considerably. He took five rounds, the Gunboat had two and three were even. He entered the ring weighing about 174 and Smith about 180.

Dillon confined his attack almost exclusively to the body and he had Smith's entire mid-section a beautiful rosette tint as the result of a hard two handed pounding. Smith's best blows were a long left swing to the head and a right cross. Jack wised up to that left early, but one got past his guard in the eighth and nearly floored him, the nearest to a knockdown in the whole fight. There was a world of action in every period.

### First, Smith's Best Round.

The first was Smith's best round. He used left and right effectively and made Dillon look bad. Jack evened up the second with his body punches, and went out into the lead in the next round. The fourth was the prettiest session in the entire fracas, both men whaling away for dear life. The fifth, sixth and seventh were all Dillon's. After Dillon piled up a lead in the eighth, Smith evened things by nearly flooring him. The Gunboat's upper cut was working for the first time in the ninth and he had a shade. They staged a whirlwind finish in the tenth, with Dillon having the round and the fight.

Billy Miske, St. Paul middleweight, had a slight shade on Gus Christie of Milwaukee in the semi-windup. The entire eighth rounds were slow and uninteresting. Eddie Francke, local amateur, made his professional debut and held Mike Hirsch, Chicago middleweight, to a six round draw. Johnny Ritchie of Chicago beat Kay Krause, local bantam, over the same route. The crowd was the smallest ever attending an Auditorium show.

## HAVANA FLOCKS TO SEE WILLARD

Jess Reached Havana Last Night and Went at Once to His Training Quarters.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] HAVANA, March 17.—All Havana flocked to Miramar today to get a glimpse of the white giant who is to battle Jack Johnson for the world's championship April 4. Jess Willard, accompanied by his manager, Tom Jones, and a retinue of trainers, arrived in Havana last night and went at once to Miramar where training quarters had been reserved for him.

Willard was scheduled to work out today and the Cubans, anxious to see how he stacks up, fairly swarmed to his training quarters. The giant white man weighs 250 pounds. He was announced on his arrival. His work in the next two weeks is expected to bring him down to 240, which figure he expects to make by the day he meets the black.

Johnson expressed satisfaction that Willard has arrived. "Now I guess nothing can happen to keep me from landing him a beating," was the way he commented on it.

## TWO REAL CHAMPS TO CLASS TONIGHT

Johnny (Kid) Williams and Johnny Kilbane Will Go Six Rounds at Philadelphia Tonight.

## EACH HOLDS A TITLE

And Each is a Master in His Class—Kilbane Favorite on Account of His Size.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., March 17.—For the first time in years two real boxing champions will meet each other here tonight. Johnny (Kid) Williams, champion of the bantamweights, and Johnny Kilbane, king pin of the feathers, mix before the Olympia A. A. in a six round no-decision contest.

Only a knockout will bring the two titles to one man, and even the most ardent supporter of either of the combatants does not claim that such a result is likely. Kilbane, on account of his advantage in height, reach and weight is generally conceded a winner on points by unbiased critics. The supporters of the doughty little blonde from Baltimore and they are legion—maintain, however, that their favorite's rushing, whirlwind tactics will sweep the featherweight's offensive aside and return him a victor, even in the six round clash.

Each of these youngsters has proven himself complete master of his class. Kilbane, since he wrestled his title from the once famous wizard of the ring, Abe Attell, has won handily from everyone he has met except one. That one—Johnny Dundee—has since outgrown the featherweight ranks and can no longer claim to be a rival for Kilbane's crown. Dundee got a draw with Kilbane a year ago in twenty rounds at Los Angeles.

Williams won his title by knocking out Johnny Coulon, for years the demon of the little fellows. Coulon was all in when he fell before Williams, being but a shadow of his former self. But since then Williams has proven that he had a real right to the title. He has beaten every challenger he has met, a great many of them falling via the knockout route.

It took a great deal of money to bring these two together. Kilbane demanded \$5,000 and as he was a champion, too, Williams wanted as much. The promoters at first could only see their way clear to giving \$6,000 for the bout. They raised that to \$7,500 and finally they are said to have put the figure up to \$10,000. Indications were by the advance sale, that they would barely clear that much in receipts.

## PORTER EXPECTS TO GET HUNTERS

District United States Attorney intimates Some Prosecutions Will be Started by Him.

## IN THIS PART OF STATE

Federal Officer Has Just Returned From Washington and Hints That Informations Are Filed.

Claude Porter'll get you, if you don't watch out! This might be the warning which could be given any hunters in this section of the state, who are contemplating violating the federal game law. For District Attorney Porter has returned from Washington and has announced that he is going to prosecute some violations of the federal migratory bird law.

Harry Barmer, federal inspector, when he was here two weeks ago, intimated that all was serene in this particular section of the state, but the federal officials have been scouting around the Green Bay country near Fort Madison, it is said.

The Register and Leader prints the following concerning District Attorney Porter and his actions: Mr. Porter asserted that he has received information against at least three Iowa persons directly from the department of justice at Washington and that he will use the data the government officials have sent him in prosecuting the cases.

"I understand that Iowa hunters are laboring under the impression that the government does not mean business in the matter of protecting the migratory birds in this state and that they think the officials are not in earnest," said Porter last night. "For the benefit of those hunters," he continued, "I will say that the data I have in hand on the cases at present is direct from Washington and has been gathered by government agents. I shall begin the prosecution of these cases directly after I have returned from Washington. I expect to return some time early next week."

Mr. Porter left for Washington last night. While in the capital he will discuss the plumbers' case and other matters in hand with the attorney general and department officials. The motion for a new trial for the thirty-six convicted plumbers will be heard here by Federal Judge John C. Pollock of Kansas City, Kan., March 30.

The district attorney stated, however, that one of the chief reasons of his eastern visit is to discuss with officials the attitude of many Iowa hunters relative to the game laws here. He declared that the government "means business" and that the game here will be protected.

### Kansas Farmers Confer.
