

**LARCENY CHARGE
AGAINST NEGROES**
Procedure Against Smith and Ward is in Accordance With New Law—To Plead Monday.

Information charging larceny were filed against William Smith and John Ward, the negroes who are accused of having stolen a net from Miller brothers.
