

TRAGEDY IN HOME OF THE BANKER

No Motive is Known Why Boocock Murdered His Wife and Then Shot Himself.

NEW YORK, March 23.—Shrouded in mystery today was the motive for the murder by Howard Boocock, treasurer of the Astor Trust Co., of his young wife and his suicide in their sumptuous home on East 74th street.

A coroner's investigation today disclosed that Boocock evidently shot his wife while she was seated at a pianola in the parlor. She was shot through the left temple. Her body with powder stains on the head, was found over the pianola. Boocock's body was found lying on a couch with a bullet through the head and a revolver clutched in the right hand.

Four servants said they heard two shots, but thought they were auto tires blowing out and did not leave their rooms on the fourth floor to investigate. Boocock had been moody at dinner. Boocock was thirty-nine, a member of many prominent clubs and a Yale graduate.

WADE DECLARES INJUSTICE DONE

Federal Judge Says Attack From Chicago Man is Unfair and Gives His Side of It.

IS FINISHING HIS WORK

Says He is Working Hard to Close up Business That Other Attorneys May Take Hold.

Judge Martin J. Wade, recently appointed to the federal court for the southern Iowa district, in a published interview corrects certain misstatements that appeared in Chicago papers relative to his relation as an attorney to a sale of stock of a Canadian townsite corporation.

"Connecting my name in the newspapers with the recent arrest of Mr. St. John, in Chicago, is a vicious outrage. A man by the name of Toner charges him with false representations in the sale of some stock in the Transcontinental Town Site company of Winnipeg, of which Mr. St. John has been manager since it was established. I never had a dollar of interest in the company referred to, directly or indirectly. I never sold any stock, nor had I anything to do with the sale of the stock, directly or indirectly. I am not now and never was attorney for Mr. St. John. I know nothing personally of the controversy between Toner and Mr. St. John. I never saw Mr. Toner to my knowledge, and never had any communications from him of any kind. If he had confided in me, I am satisfied that I could have convinced him that I had absolutely nothing to do with the matter.

HOW SOLDIERS LIVE AND FIGHT IN THE TRENCHES.
