

BED WITH HISTORY TO BE PRESERVED

Had Been in Possession of the Lee Family of Virginia for Many Years.

A recent edition of the Clark County Courier has the following account concerning the disposition of a bed that for a century and a half has been in the Lee family of Virginia, of interest to many here as it has been left to Senator Charles F. Carter of Clark county, Missouri:

Through the family connection of Senator Charles F. Carter of Clark county, and his intense state pride, Missouri is to acquire one of the most historic pieces of furniture in the country.

It is a bed that for a century and a half has been in the Lee family of Virginia and during the entire lifetime of Gen. Robert E. Lee, the confederate chieftain, was a part of his household equipment.

The bed is owned by Mrs. James Baughman of Danville, Ky., who recently visited Jefferson City as the guest of her cousin, Senator Carter. She promised to present the bed to Senator Carter.

Mrs. Baughman had her will drawn some time ago and in it bequeathed the bed to Arlington, where many of Lee family relics are being gathered and cared for by the national government.

When she learned that Senator Carter keenly desired to possess the historic bed, however, she announced that she would annul that provision of the will.


Mrs. Baughman's father and Senator Carter's father were cousins of Robert E. Lee's mother. His grandmother on his mother's side was Jane Lee, cousin of Robert E. Lee, giving him the distinction of being a third cousin in blood to the great confederate leader on both sides of the family.

The bed is a magnificent piece of mahogany, of the four-poster style, beautifully designed. Tradition has it that LaFayette on his visit to America in 1824 slept upon this bed.

Grape juice has a temple all its own at the big San Francisco fair. Its exhibits show why the Lake Erie vineyards are so rich, for millions of gallons of "the national drink" are now consumed by Americans every year.

The Palace was dedicated February 20, by Dr. C. E. Welch, of Westfield, N. Y., grape juice pioneer and head of the company which built the temple.

The exhibits tell the story of grape juice from the first dozen bottles put up in a kitchen in 1839 and prescribed by physicians as a tonic to the vast manufacturing plants of today, whose annual output is three million gallons.
