BATTLESHIP IS SENT SOUTH

Alabama Goes to Hampton Roads to See That Neutrality is Not Violated.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] WASHINGTON, March 28.—(Sunday)—The battleship Alabama was ordered to Hampton Roads for neutrality duty, according to announcement of the officer of the day of the navy department early today. She is now with the reserve fleet at Philadelphia league navy yard.

Secretary Daniels last night conferred with Admiral Fiske concerning the navy's strength inside the Virginia capes, where the German converter cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich is undergoing repairs while a squadron of British and French warships watches outside. The admiral stated there were available one destroyer, the Barney, one almost obsolete submarine and one revenue cutter.

Daniel directed that other warships now at Philadelphia be prepared to start for Norfolk should they be needed. It was explained there is no actual danger, but the government prefers to "take no chances."

To Increase Our Army.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] WASHINGTON, March 27.—The United States will organize to fill gaps in the mobile army and create a real reserve. It was admitted tonight that Secretary Garrison has assigned Chief of General Staff Scott to decide what must be done. As soon as he returns to Washington, Scott will begin studying how to increase the regular army, so as to fill vacancies created by transfers to Panama and Hawaii and how to reorganize the reserve with a view to a trained citizen soldiery that will not burden the treasury.

It is understood Scott and the war college members hope to complete plans by mid-summer, that high commissioned officers everywhere may consider them for some months before President Wilson passes them on to congress, when it meets in December.

Use Prison Money.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] JACKSON, Miss., March 27.—The board of prison trustees this afternoon drew \$90,000 from the state treasury and it will be used in paying expenses of getting 5,400 bales of cotton grown and owned by the state to Copenhagen, Denmark.

Saw a Zeppelin.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] LONDON, March 27.—Reports received here tonight stated that a Zeppelin was seen flying over northern Holland late this afternoon and headed apparently for England. No reports of any Zeppelin raid had been received here.

Under Foreign Flag.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] WASHINGTON, March 27.—President Wilson will eat Monday, it was announced tonight, under a foreign flag. With Secretary Daniels and his aides, he will leave on the yacht Mayflower Sunday evening for Annapolis, inspect the new Argentine dreadnaught Marcano there, and lunch on board.

German Cruiser Reported.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] RIO DE JANEIRO, March 27.—It was reported in shipping circles tonight that the German auxiliary cruiser Kronz Prinz Wilhelm had been sighted two weeks ago off the island of Fernando de Noronha in the south Atlantic.

NEW LOVE CULT LEADER IN JAIL

Girl Who is Alleged to Have Been His Victim, is Buried by the Quakers.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] ALLIANCE, Ohio, March 27.—While the body of Amy Tanner, Quaker convert of P. A. George's "new love" cult, lay in her grave at the Alliance cemetery tonight, official dissection threatened to stop the inquiry into her death.

The state board of health tonight ordered suspension of the proposed second analysis of the girl's vital organs in search for poison, because Stark county had not authorized the payment of the expenses and Prosecutor A. Talmage Snyder halted the preliminary investigation started by city officials.

Snyder declared the case must be taken to the grand jury immediately after the inquest was completed and asserts the probe will begin on April 7—no matter what the coroner's finding.

The general impression in Alliance tonight is that there is evidence to hold George definitely. The brotherhood home is not yet closed.

The funeral of Miss Tanner was held this afternoon with simple Quaker rites. The little church was jammed as Quaker Ministers Haworth and Pennington preached, but only the family was allowed to follow the body to the grave.

George summoned his wife and others of the brotherhood to the police chief's office tonight and was to make a statement "ordered by God," telling of practices of the cult.

White Apostle George knelt in his cell at the Alliance jail this afternoon and prayed for the salvation of his cult, his "spirit wife," Mrs. Belle Knox George, pleaded with him to leave the Brotherhood of God and live with her, as other men live with their wives—alone in their own homes.

The "spirit wife" arose from her sick bed in Cleveland today when the apostle summoned her to Alliance to appear with him at a private hearing before the mayor and chief of police. "I am fighting manfully and God is most strongly with me," George wrote "Hold up bravely, though the clouds hang black and low and bless His dear name. I am still trusting in Him and the newspaper men have about quit."

But when Mrs. George arrived, she came with the firm purpose, she said in Cleveland, to persuade the "appointed apostle of love" that the world cannot understand his teachings and he should observe conventions.

Morris sued for alleged malicious prosecution, claiming the defendants conspired to have him removed from the postal service. He was arrested, but later freed.
