**Friends Have Confidence.**  
NEW YORK, April 1.—Reported presence of small samples of gasoline and other oils in his baggage on the French steamer La Touraine when he sailed from here for France last March is the only circumstance upon which Raymond Boite Swoboda, an American, is held in Paris charged with attempting to set fire to the vessel while enroute.

This was declared today by friends and business associates of Swoboda, who expressed confidence in his absolute innocence. Information that Swoboda had gasoline and oil samples in his baggage came from employees of the French steamship line. On the other hand Swoboda's friends denied that he carried such articles and said, as a salesman dealing with the allies, he had nothing but samples of clothes, army shoes and the like. R. K. McLea, former textile expert for the federal tariff board and associate of Swoboda, today appealed to the state department to have Swoboda freed. He and Thomas Hooper of Victoria, B. C., a Canadian, and Eugene Davis and W. F. Moser, of this city, all declared that they and Swoboda were engaged in selling supplies to the allies with Swoboda handling the Paris end.

# RUSSIA

[United Press Leased Wire Service.]  
PETROGRAD, April 1.—Taking advantage of an apparent weakness in the German lines west of Warsaw, the Slavs have delivered a number of swift smashes against General Mackensen's forces along a fifty mile front extending from the Vistula to Opoczno. The first infantry charge was ordered Tuesday morning. Almost hourly fresh Russian battalions have hurled themselves upon the German trenches and indicated gains at several points. Mackensen's forces have been greatly depleted, according to word brought to the Russian war office. Regiments drawn away from his army to co-operate with Von Hindenburg in the Mazurian lakes fighting were not returned, but instead were hurried through Hungary to aid in the defense of the Carpathian passes. Though the fighting south of the Vistula thus far has been of local character, there are indications of a real offensive, designed to throw back the Germans from in front of Warsaw before the spring campaign opens, is about to be launched.

It is now officially admitted here that the Russian losses in the Carpathian battles have been extremely heavy in the last few days. The Austrians, however, are reported to have lost more than 20,000 in killed and wounded near the Lupkow and Uzok passes.

### PAINTERS REFUSE TO GO TO WORK

Demanding 70 Cents Per Hour for the Next Two Years, and Didn't Get It.

CHICAGO, April 1.—As they had threatened, 3,000 union painters struck in Chicago today. When the men reported for work this morning they demanded they be shown signed agreements that their demand for seventy cents an hour would be given them for the next two years. The contractors having refused to sign any agreements until the wage increase question is settled by arbitration, the men gathered up their tools and walked out.

The strike has completely tied up nearly every big building in the course of construction in the loop district and hundreds of apartment houses, which owners had hoped to have finished in time for Chicago's big moving day, May 1.

**Reckless Newspapering.**  
Iowa City Republican: The most outrageous bit of newspapering that has been published in many months is the work of the Chicago papers in dealing with the affairs of a townsite company of Winnipeg and the reckless manner in which Judge Wade of this city was brought into the limelight.

Judge Wade is not a stockholder in the company, has nothing to do with its affairs. He represents the Winner estate of plebeia, Iowa, which has stock in the company and a claim against it of \$125,000. He was at a meeting of the stockholders, acting as attorney for the estate. The object of the meeting was to try to adjust the financial difficulties in which the company had become involved on account of war conditions.

There were many other lawyers holding the same relations with the company as Judge Wade, but they are not mentioned. The fact that he is a national committeeman of a party and has just been appointed and confirmed as a judge of the United States court, makes him a valuable asset in newspaper sensation and scandal.
