MEXICO, Mo., April 1.—Mexico, ordinarily probably the "horsesiest" horse town in the country today is given over to horse buyers here from all sections of the United States to attend the annual spring sale of saddle and harness animals. Despite the fact that thousands of handsome specimens have been sent from Missouri to European battlefields, local and visiting horsemen say the array of stock for the spring sale is one of the best seen in many years.

Mexico practically lives on horse. Horse-raising and horse-training com-

prise the city's principal industry. Any baby boy in Mexico at the age of ten months or so who can't babble something that sounds like "horse," is pitied.
