She said it was not until some time later she discovered the decree was not drawn up until May, 1913. She said she has not lived with Brady since December, 1913.

WRECKS ON CURB TO AVERT CRASH

Driver Ran Automobile Into Curb to Avoid Collision With Another Machine—No One Injured.

TWO WHEELS SMASHED

Machine Had Just Been Overhauled and Was Out for the First Time This Year.

To avoid a collision with another automobile, J. S. Moore drove his car into the curb at the corner of Sixth and Blondeau streets at 2:15 this afternoon. A much more serious accident was narrowly averted when Mr. Moore prevented his car from crashing into the other one. No one was injured in the accident.

The interurban car standing in front of the Grand theatre, was largely responsible for the accident. Mr. Moore was driving east on Blondeau street, while the other machine was going north on Sixth street, the driver intending to turn to the right and also go east on Blondeau. On account of the interurban car, Mr. Moore was unable to see the approaching machine until the two were very close.

The car that had come up Sixth street turned the corner to the right, the driver not seeing Mr. Moore until too late to come to a stop or to keep in very close to the curb when he turned.

When Mr. Moore saw the automobile emerge from behind the interurban car, he attempted to turn north on Sixth street instead of continuing east on Blondeau. He made the turn too late, however, and his machine ran over the curb, breaking both front wheels, and coming to a stop a few feet farther on, after plowing up some of the bricks in the sidewalk intersection. The other machine was not damaged.

Both front wheels of Mr. Moore's car were broken, the steering rod twisted, and one front tire blown out. Mr. Moore himself, was not thrown out when the front wheels of his car struck the curb and was not injured. He said after the accident, that his machine had just been overhauled and that he had it out for the first time this year. His car is a small two passenger Maxwell.

The Third Degree

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] NEW YORK, April 2.—Carmine Carbone, one of the two Italians in trial charged with plotting to blow up St. Patrick's cathedral, swore today that detectives slugged him in an attempt to get him to "confess" and implicate a number of anarchist leaders.

Carbone denied that he was at the cathedral on the morning of the alleged attempt. He said he was arrested at his home by six policemen who beat him unmercifully when he denied he had any knowledge of a bomb plot.

Her Second Trial

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] MINEOLA, L. I., April 2.—Mrs. Florence Carman, wife of Dr. Edwin Carman of Freeport, will go to trial the second time for the murder of Mrs. Louise Bailey on May 10. District Attorney Smith announced today. Judge Abel Blackmar will preside.

A jury disagreed in the first trial of the physician's wife who was accused of shooting Mrs. Bailey in the doctor's office. District Attorney Smith hinted today that he had discovered new evidence, but said both he and Mrs. Carman's attorneys had agreed not to discuss the case before it went to trial.
