CHICAGO, April 21.—Ad Wolgast, one time king of the lightweights, has turned promoter. Wolgast was in town today and announced he was representing a Wisconsin syndicate which had \$26,000 for Mike Gibbons and Packey McFarland, the minute they attached their monikers to a set of articles. Who is back of the syndicate, Ad refused to say. Twenty-five thousand will be paid for the bout itself and a \$500 bonus will be paid each man the minute he signs, said Ad.

CHERRY PICKING LAW IS UPHELD

Amendment to Board of Control Bill is Believed to Cover Case at Fort Madison.

An apparently insignificant amendment to the control board bill which passed the Iowa legislature the last day of its session makes statutory the provisions embodied in the Fort Madison ordinance prohibiting use of convict labor within the city limits. The chief purpose of the bill is to place all prison labor under a "state accounts" head, and the amendment says:

"Provided, however, that none of the said employment shall be performed within the corporate limits of Fort Madison or Anamosa, unless performed upon state premises, and except as pertains to existing contracts, or except as performed for the benefit of the state."

The interpretation of the amendment does not preclude the use of convicts for strictly state work within the city, such as transferring freight, going to and from the depots, etc.

It is not unlikely that the pending litigation growing out of the passing of the city ordinance at Ft. Madison, and by which the warden is now technically incarcerated for allowing convicts to pick cherries within the city in violation thereof, will be dismissed by the attorneys for the state. Senator Fratley, who is Ft. Madison's city attorney, in the matter, stated that he anticipated such action.
