FILED PLAT OF BOULEVARD PARK

New Addition Lies Just North of Messengersville and Plank Road—Owned by Realty Company.

EQUALIZATION BOARD

Council Ends Work in This Capacity—Tree in Rand Park, Monument, Destroyed by Vandal.

A plat of Boulevard Park addition has been filed with the city council by the owners of the property, the Keokuk Realty company. A conference between the council and representatives of the company was to be held this afternoon. The council wished to go over several matters regarding the plat before it is adopted. The addition lies just north of Messengersville and the Plank road. The plat was filed by the president of the company, F. A. Wilmering, and the secretary, B. B. Hobbs. The council today completed its work of sitting as a board of equalization after spending the morning in making inspections of property, the assessments against which were objected to by the property owners. Commissioner Schmidt announced today that a young birch tree planted in Rand park near the monument in honor of Cora H. K. Pittman has been destroyed by some vandal. The tree had been cut on one side and then broken. It was about eight feet high. Another tree has been planted by Commissioner Schmidt to replace this one. A tree in honor of Miss Pittman was originally planted here under the direction of the Daughters of the American Revolution. This tree had been destroyed in some way and the one last destroyed was planted only about a week ago.

FRAUD NOT CHARGED TO LOCAL CONCERN

Investigation Shows Kellogg-Birge Co. Innocently Took up Bill of Lading.

A further investigation of the case filed in the district court yesterday by the Wabash Railroad company against Kellogg-Birge Co., and reported in yesterday's Gate City, shows there is no charge of fraud or irregularity made against Kellogg-Birge Company. They seem to be victims of a purported forged bill of lading, which it is alleged, was made out by a Detroit, Mich., firm and which Kellogg-Birge Co. innocently took up through one of the local banks, paying the draft attached for the amount of the invoice covering the car of beans. It appears the original owners have secured a judgment against the railroad and now they are taking the next step in the proceedings by bringing the suit filed yesterday. Kellogg-Birge Co. paid for the car of beans in the regular way and the Detroit people will no doubt have a chance later to explain their part in this transaction.

The steamer Yosonmie, which sailed for Astoria yesterday, with forty passengers, returned to San Francisco today. The captain's wireless stated his ship was damaged by the immense waves.

The outcome was a market of the greatest irregularity driven backward and forward by the alternative rush of speculative buying or selling and with entirely opposite movements prevailing at the same moment in different groups of stocks. Industrial shares to which a "war order" rumor could be plausibly attached made such advances as 9 or 10 points; professional Wall street insisting excitedly on another Bethlehem. Whether the heavy selling which occurred simultaneously in other stocks was attributable to dislike of these historical performances, or merely to judgment that profits might be taken advantageously while speculative sentiment was thus excited, remained for individual conjecture to determine. But the general market including the stocks which had advanced so violently closed weak throughout.
