BAN CARD BOARD LICENSE PLATES

Automobile Drivers Must Equip Their Cars With Regular Plates or Answer to the Police.

MORE INFORMATION

Charges Against Three More Drivers Filed in the Superior Court This Morning.

Those improvised card board license plates for automobiles will not be accepted at their face value by the police here any longer. Chief Kenney issued instructions to his officers this morning to arrest drivers whose cars are equipped with card board tags instead of the regular license plates.

While 1915 license plates cannot now be obtained by some drivers on account of a shortage in these plates at Des Moines, Chief Kenney said the drivers should use either a dealer's number or a 1914 number plate until the new ones can be obtained.

There are a large number of cars in Keokuk now equipped with the card board licenses to which Chief Kenney objects. These will have to be changed at once unless the drivers wish to encounter the displeasure of the authorities.

Indications are that the campaign now being waged by the police against violators of the city's traffic ordinances will be continued through the summer. The number of drivers being haled before Judge McNamara daily shows no signs of decreasing.

Today three more informations were filed against drivers while one paid a fine for an offense committed several days ago. This was W. M. Thomas. He paid \$2.85, costs of prosecution, for driving his car at night without lights.

B. F. Harrison of Sutter, Ill., paid costs this morning for driving his car on Main street without being equipped with license plates. Informations were also filed against Hugh Robertson, charged with driving his car last night without having the rear light lit, and against Frank Haubert who must answer the same charge.

M'CALL ROBBERS ARE CAPTURED

Three Lads, Heavily Armed, Give the Sheriff of Hancock County Merry Chase.

CARTHAGE, Ill., May 6.—Armed with a shotgun, target rifle and a 45 Colts revolver, the three youths who broke into and robbed a store in McCall on Sunday were caught last evening by Sheriff Mosley, his deputy, Fred Johnson, and State's Attorney Clyde Johnson, after they had led the representatives of the law a merry chase. They fortified themselves in a house two miles west of McCall, and when the officers forced an entrance in the front they fled via the rear door, and were immediately followed in hot pursuit across the fields. The officers, with the aid of some laborers, were finally enabled to surround and arrest them.

During the chase they dropped their guns, which were found later, but when searched a long bladed knife and a number of cartridges were found. The boys, two of whom are 18 and the other 20 years old, are now in the Carthage jail.

The youthful robbers are Earl and Ralph Murphy and Floyd Miller. The latter's father is a resident of this city and he appeared this morning to furnish bond for his boy, who will be bound over to the October term of the grand jury. Mr. Murphy, father of the other two lads, lives in Champagne. He has been notified and will arrive tomorrow morning.

CARE REGARDING SEWAGE IS URGED

Iowa Board of Health Issues Bulletin in Which Pollution of the Streams is Dealt With by Experts.

LOOK OUT FOR OTHERS

Even Though Water May Not be for Drinking Purposes, It May Contaminate People in Other Places.

The Iowa state board of health comments upon the habit of turning waterways into open sewers, as follows:

Many small towns in Iowa are arranging to put in waterworks and sewage systems. The small streams which run through farms in Iowa where dairy cows pasture are being used to the extreme detriment of farming communities for the carrying off of the raw sewage from the towns. This is an exceedingly dangerous process and should be prohibited by law. Some persons are saying that streams can be used for carrying off raw sewage if the stream is not used to furnish drinking water. This is a serious mistake, as dairy cows wade in these streams which are polluted by raw sewage and the udders of the cows become contaminated with raw sewage because they wade in these polluted streams, and during the milking process the sewage finds its way into the milk, thereby conveying disease to innocent babies and children. These dairy cows also drink this polluted water and only for the straining process which takes place in the cow this polluted water would find its way into the milk.

Utensils May Carry Disease.

Again, many of these streams are used by the farmers for washing milk utensils and other articles about the house, thereby increasing the possibilities for disease transmission. Anything washed from these streams becomes, in a measure, a disease carrier, therefore, there should be some legislation which will prevent these towns from contaminating and infecting these streams with human sewage. It should be remembered in this connection that the diseases of animals are not so dangerous to man as the diseases of man are to man. Human sewage is the great problem which is confronting all boards of health. The proper disposal of human

sewage is the work of health boards, but health boards must be authorized by law to use preventive measures. The preventive measures to be used are, that all human sewage should be properly treated before being allowed to contaminate the streams of our state.

No Economy in Method.

It is no economy to create conditions which cause disease and untimely deaths. All sewage should be properly treated before being allowed to enter streams, and all water taken from streams for household purposes, such as for drinking and cooking, should be properly filtered and possibly treated before being used. There is no problem more important at the present time than the proper protection of the water supplies of this country.

Legislatures and law making bodies should see to it that proper laws are enacted to protect the water supplies of the country. The definition of a river in the geographies used to be this: "A river is a stream of water flowing through the land." At the present time we must revise this definition and in Iowa it must read: "A river is an open sewer flowing through the land." It will therefore be seen that all of the rivers and streams of Iowa have been and are being made into open sewers.

Communities, therefore, will find it pays in the end to go to the expense necessary to protect this important article of daily use.

AUTO INDUSTRY AT STATE PRISON

Board of Control Takes Up This Branch and Will Promote It—Contracts Being Entered.

The manufacture of two ton auto trucks will be taken up by the board of control at the penitentiary at Fort

Madison. The Democrat says concerning this new industry: A talk with Mr. W. J. Dixon, a member of the board of control, brought to light some interesting facts in connection with that body, and disclosed that in the multitude of matters it has to look after, there is plenty of room for strenuous work. That the board does work strenuously is indicated by the minuteness of its investigations and reports upon them. Scarcely a detail escapes its eye, and the system which it has adopted for looking after minor matters as well as the larger ones is admirable for its practicality. The board has been experimenting

with the manufacture of auto trucks at the penitentiary, and Mr. Dixon now says that it intends to enter into the manufacture of them of 2-2½ ton capacity for sale to farmers and state institutions. Warden Sanders was so successful with the two experimental trucks he has just finished and put into use, the board decided to adopt the manufacture as an industry, and it is the intention to place them for sale to dealers and jobbers within the state.

Orders are being placed by Warden Sanders for parts for two more auto trucks which will be built immediately. The board of control is going to sell the two manufactured.
