JAIL SENTENCE IS GIVEN J. COX

Man Who Pleaded Guilty to Breaking and Entering Must Serve One Year in County Prison.

James Cox who pleaded guilty to breaking and entering, was sentenced this afternoon by Judge W. S. Hamilton, in the district court, to pay a fine of \$100 and to be confined in the Lee county jail for one year at hard labor. In imposing sentence, Judge Hamilton said that he knew nothing of the case and would rely upon the county attorney's recommendation.

Arguments were being made in the case of McCann vs. Karl and Hawkes this afternoon. The case will go to the jury tonight.

Two Boats Sunk. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] PORT HURON, Mich., May 15.—Colliding head-on with the steamer Valcartier at the foot of Lake Huron, during the heavy fog today, the big steel steamer F. M. Osborne was so badly damaged that she sank within a few minutes. The crew was taken off by the wrecking tug Manistiquet.

A big hole was smashed in the Valcartier and she also settled to the bottom after being towed into St. Clair river.

The Hessian Fly. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] MANHATTAN, Kan., May 13.—The new wheat pest discovered this week in Kansas isn't new at all. It is the old enemy of the wheat growers, the Hessian fly, that is laying waste the wheat fields. Investigation by George A. Dean, state entomologist, shows damage in Kansas during the last ten days estimated at ten million dollars. Dean says a further crop of spring fields within a few days will augment the damage already done.

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ACTION TAKEN BY COUNCIL TODAY

Several Resolutions Passed, Covering Work Already Ordered by the City Council.

BILLS ORDERED PAID

Council Formally Adopts Resolution Calling for the Purchase of Auto Fire Truck.

Several resolutions of formal character were passed by the city council today concerning action already decided upon. A resolution of necessity was passed covering the improvement of Kilbourne place between Bank and Exchange streets, by paving thirty feet wide and by curbing.

A resolution covering the purchase of automobile fire trucks by the city was passed as follows: That in the opinion of the city council the interest of the city would be conserved by the purchase of a combination auto fire truck of some standard make as a substitute for the present horse drawn apparatus at the Sixth street station. Also that a two seated auto equipped with two fire extinguishers be purchased by the city for the use of the fire chief.

The resolution covering the issuance of \$10,500 city funding bonds passed May 6, having been on file for seven days, was finally adopted by the council this morning.

Bills covering improvements amounting to \$1,329.55 were ordered paid by the council. The work was done by the Keokuk Quarry and Construction company and was in various parts of the city. The warrants were distributed between the improvement, bridge, grading, sewer, and park funds.

Daily Stock Letter. [Copyright 1915 by the New York Evening Post.] NEW YORK, May 13.—It was entirely natural that uncertainty first as to the language of our government's note to Germany, and second as to the Berlin government's answer, should have restrained activity on the stock exchange today and should have depressed the market. The stock exchange alternately backed and filled in its attitude towards prices with the general trend downward. The retreat of the German foreign office in the published declaration of yesterday from its position of February of responsibility for destruction of neutral vessels, was in some quarters deemed to foreshadow a still more complete abandonment of recent pretensions, when our state department now calls for explanations as to the Lusitania barbarity. There was some evidence in today's market, however, as there has been for several days, that more attention was being paid to the extremely sound position of American finance and American trade and to the bearing of that on the course of events. This consideration along with the possibility that the controversy may be adjusted without war, explained the comparative steadiness of the market after the first decline; but it did not withstand the downward tendency at the close.
