Damages to the Extent of \$15,000 Demanded by Administratrix of Estate of Cecelia Griffin, From Andrew Anderson.

DEATH FOLLOWS INJURY

Petition Claims That There Was Negligence on Part of Owner of Car and Minor Son Who Drove.

As the result of an automobile accident, which resulted in the death of Miss Cecelia Griffin, suit was filed today in the district court by Mary Griffin, administratrix of the estate of Cecelia Griffin, against Andrew Anderson, asking judgment for \$15,000.

The petition alleges that Andrew Anderson is the father of Perry Anderson, a minor, 15 years old, and that on April 24 he came here on business or pleasure, and that he caused his minor son to act as driver of the car.
