MUST GET MONEY WITHIN TEN DAYS

Standard Four Tire Company Has Short Time in Which to Secure \$20,000 to Locate Factory Here.

KEOKUK MUST GET BUSY

List of Stockholders is Held up for Day or Two Until Additional Names Can be Secured.

The Standard Four Tire company has ten more days, according to the agreement signed a week ago, in which to raise the \$20,000 from Keokuk. Although the work of soliciting has been carried on for a week now, and has progressed to some extent, it is not progressing as rapidly as the company's backers had hoped for. If the money is not raised within the coming ten days, Keokuk will lose this factory by default. The trouble will lie entirely with the people of the city if this chance is let go by. It is the chance they have been asking for, and opportunity, according to the old saying, doesn't come around more than once. It is no secret to say that other cities are waiting for this factory if Keokuk doesn't see fit to subscribe the money for the stock. Des Moines is believed here, to be all ready in case Keokuk falls.

The Standard Four Tire company officials, however, want to come to Keokuk, and if Keokuk people live up to the reputation they have always had, they will bring the company in here. According to the Register and Leader, I. V. McLean has announced that the company will come here. The other officials are all partial to Keokuk, so it is up to the citizens as to whether or not they want the factory. The Register article says: "I. V. McLean, promoter of the Standard Four Tire company which it was first announced would build a factory here, definitely announced yesterday that he had decided to put his factory at Keokuk."

It had been planned to publish the first list of stockholders today, but this has been deferred for a day or so until the list is larger. Practically all of the big subscribers have been secured, and the salesmen are out today with their lists for the smaller blocks of stock.

The \$20,000 that is to be raised is an investment and not a subscription, and it is up to Keokuk to say whether this city will retain this factory or whether it will be let go through want of co-operation and liberality.

ARRAIGNED ON WIFE DESERTION CHARGE

Paul Davis, Colored, is Bound Over to Await Action of Grand Jury.

Paul Davis, colored, was bound over to await the action of the grand jury in default of \$250 bond by Judge McNamara this morning when he waived preliminary arraignment to a charge of wife desertion. Davis was arrested in Memphis Tuesday and was brought here yesterday by Officer Parks.

The information filed against Davis was signed by his wife, Mamie. In it Davis is charged with deserting his wife and with failing to maintain and support her, leaving her in a destitute condition. The date set is April 3. The information was filed shortly after that time and the police had been searching for Davis since then.

Mrs. Jennie Hollingsworth, arrested last night on a charge of having been drunk and disorderly on South Ninth street between Des Moines and Palstan, was sentenced to thirty days imprisonment in the county jail when arraigned before Judge McNamara this morning. The sentence was suspended upon payment of \$5 and costs.

CHIEF KENNEY TO CHICAGO FOR LEE

Will Return Here Tonight with Man Said to Have Robbed C and S Cleaners of Suits.

Chief of Police John M. Kenney left last night for Chicago to return to this city Jack Lee who was arrested there by Chicago detectives on the request of local police. Chief Kenney will return here with his man tonight. Lee is charged with the robbery of the C and S cleaners here Saturday night when five suits of clothing were stolen from this place. He was traced to Fort Madison where the stolen suits were recovered and where it was learned by authorities here that he had left for Chicago, giving instructions to have two suit cases containing the stolen clothes expressed to Chicago. He was picked up by Chicago detectives yesterday.

Auto Turned Turtle. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, May 20.—An automobile turned turtle and caught fire with several of its passengers pinned under it early today on the curve leading around South Shore road. Four were seriously injured and two others slightly hurt. Miss Edna Beethan, Fred Noble and C. L. Legan, passengers, and the chauffeur, George B. Barlow, were badly burned. Mr. and Mrs. Charles Phillips were hurled from the car and escaped with bruises. The party was returning from an Indiana town.

CITY ACCEPTS STREET PAVING

Work on Second and South Fifth Streets is Accepted by City Council This Morning.

The city council adopted resolutions accepting the work and ordering the preparation of plan and schedule of assessments for improvement of Second street between Main and Blondeau and of South Fifth between Carroll and the bridge. The second street improvement amounts to \$1,021.08, the work having been done by Cameron, Joyce and Company. The other work was done by the Keokuk Quarry and Construction company and amounts to \$6,153.33. But two members of the council were present when the resolution was passed, Mr. Collins being in Chicago. He is expected to return Saturday.

Lisbon is Tranquil. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] MADRID, May 20.—At least 500 persons were killed or wounded in the two days fighting in Lisbon that resulted in the success of the revolutionists.

Spanish warships, ordered to the Portuguese capital to protect foreigners, have been withdrawn, excepting the battleship Espana and two torpedo boats. Official dispatches to the Spanish government today said that conditions in Lisbon are now tranquil.

Black Hand Bomb. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, May 20.—Six families were thrown into terror early today when a bomb of exceptional power was exploded in the hallway of a three story, three flat building in the heart of the Italian district. Persons on the ground floor were hurled from their beds. Every window in the building was broken. Police attribute the bomb to the black hand.

University of Michigan Festival. ANN ARBOR, Mich., May 20.—Three artists of world fame are billed today to participate in the annual "May Festival" of the University of Michigan school of music, which started here yesterday. They are John McCormick, the great Irish tenor, Mme. Ober, the Metropolitan opera star, and Harold Maurer, master pianist. A series of six concerts will be given during the four days of the festival.

Memorial for Victims. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, May 20.—Friends and relatives of the victims of the Lusitania, sent to the bottom by a German submarine, will hold memorial services for victims of the disaster on Saturday at the Fourth Presbyterian church. The services were originally planned by relatives and friends of Herbert Stuart Stone, son of the general manager of the Associated Press. Saturday would have been young Stone's birthday.

Work for Farm Hands. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] SAN ANGELO, Texas, May 20.—Hundreds of Texas laborers are planning to go to the north Texas harvest within a couple of weeks and thence into Oklahoma and Kansas, ending finally in the Dakotas.
