

OUTING MAY BE HELD IN KEOKUK

Employee of Morrell Company at Ottumwa Looking for Place to Hold Their Picnic This Season.

ASK FOR INDUCEMENTS

Chairman Writes to Find Out What Can be Offered in Way of Entertainment and Concessions.

The employees of the Morrell Packing company's plant at Ottumwa want to come to Keokuk or some other city in Iowa for their annual picnic this summer. A letter written by Joe Hanrahan, chairman of the committee was received here today. It seems that the Morrell employees have pleasant recollections of the last picnic they spent in Keokuk some ten years ago. Keokuk is one of fifteen or twenty Iowa towns which have been suggested as the place for the picnic this year.

In his letter, which is addressed to the mayor and city council, the chairman of the picnic committee asks what inducements could be offered. He speaks about the sight seeing trip over the power plant, and suggests the privilege of concessions and lunches.

He also suggests in his letter that as Ottumwa is a dry town, the saloon keepers here might reap a harvest if the excursion were to come to Keokuk.

No date is mentioned in the letter, but it is presumed that the outing will be held the latter part of the summer. The last time that the employees from the Ottumwa plant were here, they came in August.

"Hypocrites" at the Grand Wednesday.

"Hypocrites," a four reel feature film, written by Lois Weber, and produced under her personal direction, is one of the most extraordinary pictures ever placed before the public. By means of an absorbing story and superb allegory, it flays mercilessly those people who, faulty and evil themselves, yet dare to condemn the seeker after truth. The play is a daring one in its frankness, but has been handled by Miss Weber with the most exquisite delicacy, so that it is entirely without offense to the most critical.

One of her inspirations for the story was the painting by A. Fangeron, now in the Paris salon, called "The Truth," a painting which has caused more discussion than any painting of late years. In "The Hypocrites," scenes similar to that conceived by M. Fangeron are reproduced, and we see how the mirror of truth pierces the thin veneer of hypocrisy and reveals the selfishness and cowardice of men and women as they really are. Another feature of the story which will occasion wide comment is the extraordinary photographic character of the entire production. Several effects are shown which have never been done before. A triple exposure is so rare as to be subject of comment whenever it is seen. In "Hypocrites," there are several scenes of triple exposure, three with four exposures, two with five, one with nine and one with twelve. The entire production is a personal triumph for the camera man who photographed it.



SUPREME COURT ISSUES DECISIONS

Missouri Corporation Which Defied State Law, Loses its Appeal to Last Court.
[United Press Leased Wire Service.] WASHINGTON, June 1.—In the case of the Mallinckrodt Chemical company of St. Louis, the supreme court today upheld the Missouri law compelling corporations to file affidavits that they are not members of any pool, trust or trade combination.

Upholds Commission.
WASHINGTON, June 1.—The supreme court today affirmed the interstate commerce commission order reducing coal rates to Nashville, Tenn., and giving switching privileges to the Louisville and Nashville railroad competitors.

Interstate Business.
WASHINGTON, June 1.—The supreme court today reversed the Pennsylvania supreme court's decision in finding Tony Rossi, of Lowellville, Ohio, guilty of selling liquor without a license in Pennsylvania, when he took orders in Lawrence county and made rounds across the river in his wagon. Rossi contended his was interstate business, not subject to the state license.

Cotton Decision.
WASHINGTON, June 1.—The supreme court today affirmed the Louisiana district court's decision awarding \$66,000 worth of cotton to the Bank of Mulhouse, France. J. A. E. Pyle, trustee, claimed the property for creditors, following the bankruptcy of Steele, Miller and Co., of Corinth, Miss.

Mexican Claims.
[United Press Leased Wire Service] WASHINGTON, June 1.—The Carranza junta here announced today that General Carranza's government had bought six thousand tons of corn and notified local authorities in this territory that provisions would be supplied wherever needed. The governor of Queretaro was quoted as declaring his state had enough supplies to feed southern Mexico until the next crop and the governor of Guanajuato as asserting there was such an excess there that other localities could be cared for.

Off on a Long Hike.
[United Press Leased Wire Service] MILWAUKEE, Wis., June 1.—Two hundred girl students of Milwaukee normal school escorted by fifty boy students and attended by three Red Cross automobiles, started this morning on a twenty-five mile hike to Racine. The hike was the outcome of a dare and it was expected that an equal number of boys would participate. The boys, however, pleaded that it was a choice between hiking and studying and pointed out that the modern male is more studiously inclined than the female.

TWO HEADS PROVE BETTER THAN ONE

Fort-Madison Young Women Claim They Were Being Enticed Away From Home, When They Thought of Escape.

SEEKING FRENCHMEN

Young Scene Painter Who Has Been in Neighboring City, is Being Sought for on Abduction Charge.

Two Fort Madison young women matched their wits against that of a Frenchman, a scenic artist, and won. As a result, the police of Fort Madison are seeking this Frenchman, who, it is claimed, brought the girls to Keokuk and then tried to persuade them to go to Chicago with him, according to the girls' story, as given in the Fort Madison Gem City.

Eugene J. E. Jaton, an artist and a cultured Frenchman is being sought by the local police on the charge of attempted abduction. The man, it is alleged, attempted to entice two girls, both under age, to leave their homes in this city to accompany him through the country.

It develops according to the story that Jaton, who has been employed as a scene painter in a local gallery, made the acquaintance of two young women during his short stay in the city. Being a good looking young man with a quaint French accent and polished manners, besides at all times displaying good manners, the young women placed their trust in him.

Several days ago Jaton invited the two young girls to spend the evening in Keokuk with him. They accepted. The group left the city on the evening train for that city. After remaining throughout the evening the young man suggested that they catch the early morning train for Burlington and then to Chicago.

During the stay of the group in Keokuk the young man appeared perturbed and seemed lost as to what move he should make. It appears that he either feared discovery or was disappointed in not meeting someone in that city.

The girls after a short conference together, told him they would accompany him to Burlington. They boarded the morning train. When they reached Fort Madison they left the train stating that they would purchase tickets to Burlington as their round trip tickets permitted them to come only this far. When they left the train they hurried to their homes from the station.

The police have secured a picture of the young man which he gave to one of the girls here and have begun a search for him.

LEGISLATURE OF ILLINOIS

Senate Passes Bill Allowing Appropriation for Many Armories in the State.
[United Press Leased Wire Service.] SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 1.—Members of the Illinois house appear to feel better able to pay their week end railroad fares than do the senators. The senate bill to appropriate \$26,000 for this purpose today failed of passage in the lower branch, being able to muster only 93 votes. With an emergency clause the measure required 103 votes. While friends of the bill scurried about the floor in a vain search for more votes, Chairman Smedjekl of the appropriations committee moved further postponement.

The house today passed the Tice resolution to create a joint committee of six to investigate the affairs, particularly the expenditures of the University of Illinois. No accusation of mismanagement or misappropriation of funds is implied.

The house today by 78 to 23, passed the Brown bill to license optometrists. Representatives Kestinger and Ellis were credited with putting the bill through. The house passed a bill appropriating \$50,000 for an armory at Peoria.

The senate spent the morning on appropriation bills, passing all that came up on third reading. These included the Compton bill for \$50,000 for an armory at Monmouth; \$40,000 for an armory at Oak Park; \$40,000 for an armory at Sterling; \$75,000 for an armory at Kankakee; \$60,000 for one at Moline; \$40,000 for an armory at Jacksonville; \$75,000 for the eighth infantry at Chicago.

The senate also advanced to third reading, a bill to appropriate \$150,000 to purchase land lying south of the state penitentiary building. The appropriation is conditioned on a donation of \$100,000 from Springfield citizens.

A bill to appropriate \$150,000 for the county fairs of the state was laid over until afternoon on Senator Manny's request to be permitted to amend the bill to limit the amount any county may receive. The bills for the expenses of the state charitable institutions also were advanced to third reading. The amount for the Kankakee hospital was cut \$15,000 by a committee amendment.

The house today did not act on the home rule bill on account of the absence of Representatives McCormick and Frankhauser. More than a hundred telephone company representatives appeared today to oppose the bill.
