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SENTENCE GIVEN; SPOUSE SWOONS

Mrs. Edward Wood Faints Away When Husband is Sentenced to Thirty Days in County Jail.

FIVE ADMIT LARCENY

Old Soldier From Quincy Stole Garden Hose When He "Took a Little Too Much."

Mrs. Edward Wood, 1200 William street, fainted in the superior court this morning when a sentence of thirty days imprisonment in the county jail for larceny was pronounced on her husband by Judge McNamara.

Wood was sentenced with three others, H. A. Begthal, 31, James Begthal, 20, and C. Day, 24, when they entered pleas of guilty to a charge of larceny filed against them by J. R. Lawson, special agent for the C. B. & Q. railroad. All four were arrested by Lawson Saturday night when they were in the act of stealing coal from the C. B. & Q. yards. Wood is 40 years old and his wife is about the same age.

Furlough Causes Trouble. Joe Bohon, a veteran of the civil war, who has been living in the Soldiers' Home at Quincy, arrived here yesterday on a furlough. He came here with the intention of hunting work, but during his celebrations yesterday he accumulated a little too much whiskey.

When arraigned in the superior court this morning on a charge of the larceny of some garden hose valued at \$5, from John R. Carpenter, he admitted that he had stolen the hose and said he had "taken a little too much of the old booze." The judge pronounced a sentence of thirty days. It is probable that arrangements will be made to have him returned to the Quincy home.

Five were charged with having been drunk and when arraigned in the superior court this morning were released upon payment of costs. They were: F. L. Worthington, Roscoe Black, Joe Heller, Art Farnsworth and Willis Davidson.

Kansas City, Mo. Bond Issue.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 1.—Kansas City is today voting on a \$4,500,000 bond issue covering nineteen improvement items, among them \$700,000 for approaches for the new union station; \$450,000 for the improvement of existing parks; \$45,000 for a Sixth street traffic way; \$300,000 for sewers; \$50,000 for a Twenty-Third street traffic way; \$200,000 for a Twelfth street viaduct traffic level; \$300,000 for garbage disposal; and \$450,000 for bridges and viaducts.

Wild Rumors Circulated.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., June 1.—Because the commander at U. S. Fort Flagler issued orders to allow no one to visit the batteries without a special permit, wild rumors were circulated here today that foreign spies and attempts to put the big guns out of commission.

One story stated that spies were caught in the act of photographing Fort Worden, another rumor declared the breech locks of some guns at Fort Flagler had actually been removed and the loading mechanism destroyed.

It is known that extra guards have been put on duty at both forts. Ordinarily this would not occasion any gossip but in view of the war talk in connection with the present United States diplomatic negotiations and the rumors of spies, the extra guards caused talk.

Harvest Hands Moved On.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] ENID, Okla., June 1.—Militiamen patrolled the city today following the deportation of 300 harvest hands who had threatened food raids unless the city provided for them.

Two hundred other hands are still here, but there is prospect today that they too, will be deported. The five hundred had been awaiting the opening of the harvest season. Public and private institutions had cared for them until yesterday, when I. W. W. workers appeared and sought to induce them to demand \$3 a day, when their work starts.

Thereupon the "hotel" was closed and the food raid threats followed. Three hundred were quickly hustled out of town after the militia had been called out.
