ATLANTIC CITY, July 6.—Delegates to the congress of the Anti-Saloon League of America, which opened here today, will be entertained by John L. Sullivan, former fistic champion of the world, who, after being knocked out by booze, "came back" at John Harleycorn in a way that settled the issue decisively for all time, at least with John L.

The ex-champion will again enter the ring with the booze king, when he makes a temperance lecture address today before the members of the Anti-Saloon congress on the million dollar pier in this city by the sea.

If the giant fighter is successful in his initial assault on old man booze he will make a tour of the country, campaigning in the interests of the anti-saloonists. And old John L. can swing verbal punches as hard as he did his famous knock-out blows in the squared ring.

Girl Causes Wonder.

MINEOLA, L. I., July 6.—A pretty young girl, who made a dramatic appearance at the county jail early today and demanded that she be allowed to see Frank Holt, injected a new element of mystery into the investigation of the activities of the man who set off a bomb in the capitol at Washington and attempted J. P. Morgan's life.

Warden Hulse, who refused the girl admittance, said she refused to give her name or her reasons for wanting to talk to Holt. She had a letter, the jail officials said, purporting to come from the chief of police, of Dallas Texas, asking that "every courtesy" be shown her.

The girl arrived in Mineola, presumably from New York at 1:15 a. m. Holt told the jail authorities today he had no idea whom his mysterious visitor could be. His wife, he said, was in Dallas yesterday.

Though recovering from the beating at the hands of Morgan and the Morgan servants, Holt was still weak today from the loss of blood. His preliminary hearing at Glen Cove will not be held until tomorrow.

The police have not dropped the theory that Holt had accomplices both at Washington and in his attack on Morgan.

No Credentials Given.

DALLAS, Texas, July 6.—The police chief today denied he had given credentials to the girl who today called on Frank Holt at Mineola and he so informed police authorities in New York today.

Attempt at Suicide.

MINEOLA, N. Y., July 6.—By gashing his wrist with a lead pencil, Frank Holt, who tried to assassinate J. P. Morgan attempted to take his own life during the night in his cell at the Mineola jail.

Only the prompt action of a turnkey frustrated his attempt. A doctor was hurriedly summoned and the wound sewed up. Holt lost considerable blood, but it was stated this morning he was in no danger.

Turnkey John Lecherstriker watched Holt at intervals during the night. Soon after midnight he noticed blood trickling down the prisoner's clothes. He found that blood was pouring from a gash in his wrist. The jail physician was summoned. He sewed up the wound. The turnkey found a bloody pencil on the floor of the cell.

Officials considered it significant that Holt attempted his life soon after learning that he is suspected of being Muenster.

Further efforts were to be made today to identify Holt as Professor Enrico Muenster, the former Harvard professor wanted in Cambridge on a charge of murder. Charles R. Apter, assistant custodian at Harvard, T. W. Hilliard of the Middlesex county, Mass., police force and two former pupils of Muenster were expected at the Mineola county jail.

Martin W. Littleton has been retained as Holt's counsel. The prisoner dismissed T. J. Ready who was first to act as his attorney.

Holt today received the following telegram from his wife in Dallas, Texas: "Have best counsel here. Advised to rest and wait. You must do same. Loving greetings hourly. A beautiful tribute to you in both evening papers. I am tarrying for details of finances. I will come when you need me. Don't be afraid. Rest.—Leome."
