COMPANY L IS IN FIRST INFANTRY

Orders Received Yesterday by Captain Powell Give Ranking of Local Troop of National Guards.

WILL CAMP AUGUST 16-25

Orders Name Iowa City as Place for Encampment and Cavalry, Machine Gun and Engineer Corps Will be There.

Company L, First infantry, is the official title now, of the national guard troop in this city. Capt. Clarence E. Powell yesterday received general orders from Adj. Gen. Guy E. Logan for the reorganization of the Iowa National Guard. Under this order, Company L, Fifty-fourth Iowa regiment, becomes Company L of the First infantry. Headquarters will be at Tipton.

Orders were also received by Captain Powell for the annual encampment which will be held at Iowa City, August 16 to 25, for the First regiment. Company L will prepare at once for the encampment and everybody is expected to be out Monday night to receive orders regarding this event.

The officers would like to recruit ten or fifteen more men for the company here, in order to make as good a showing as possible at the encampment. The officers want to recruit the company up to full allowance by the war department before the sixteenth of August. This will be a good chance for many of the local men who want to join the company.

Companies in Camp. In camp at Iowa City next month will be the First regiment, the First cavalry, machine gun company and the engineering corps.

The squadron of cavalry composed of four companies is the first cavalry of the guard. The engineering corps, composed of Iowa City men, is headed by First Lieutenant Lambert, who is a professor of civil engineering at the State university of Iowa. The infantry does not need any recommendations of any sort as they are already known throughout the state as a very efficient military organization. The first regiment band is located at Cedar Rapids and is said to be one of the best bands in the state.

The encampment will be in the nature of a school for soldiers and it is certain that there will be plenty of hard work for the men and officers alike.

IN MEMORIAM

Mary Elizabeth Hardin was born in the city of Maryland, Va., about the year 1825. According to her statement she was about eight years old when "the stars fell," which was in the year of 1832. She was able then to carry a pail of water from a spring 1 1/2 miles, after dark. She came to Keokuk with the family of Colonel Cook, with whom she lived for some years.

The First A. M. E. church was organized in her home in 1857, by the Rev. W. A. Dove, with nine members. Mrs. Mary E. (Givins) Hardin, Mrs. Rosa Manning, Moses Henderson, York Anderson, Mrs. Susan Hunt and four others whose names cannot be remembered.

The first meeting was held in the "Scatter Good" school house. Mrs. Hardin was an active member and constant attendant to her church until illness prevented her, having filled various offices in all the auxiliary of the church.

She is survived by the following children: Mrs. Wm. Howard of Des Moines, Iowa; Mrs. M. Holt, Mrs. M. Johnson and Alfred L. Triplett, of this city, and eight grandchildren.

Deceased had been married three times. The funeral will be held from Bethel A. M. E. church Sunday, July 11, at 2:30 p. m.

Quigley attended St. Joseph's college, Buffalo, studied theology at Niagara University and Innsbruck University and graduated from the College of the Propaganda, Rome, in 1879. FORMER MATE OF SIDNEY IS HELD

Gilbert Larkin Who was Alleged to Have Been Wanted Here for Assault on Lockmaster, Arrested.

Gilbert Larkin, formerly a mate on the steamer Sidney, who was indicted in the United States court here in October, 1913, for assaulting Lockmaster Tim Harrington, but who had escaped arrest, was apprehended in Peoria, Friday by a United States marshal.

Larkin was taken before United States Commissioner Harry D. Morgan of Peoria, where he gave bond of \$1,000 for his appearance at the next term of U. S. court in this city, which will be held October 19. When discovered in Peoria, Larkin was employed on a river boat that had stopped at that city.

Larkin was accused of having struck Lockmaster Harrington, while the latter was performing his duty, and was ordering the Sidney to throw a line to a certain snubbing post.

SEEK WHEREABOUTS OF JAMES J. GRACE

Relatives Hunting Man Missing Three Years Who Was in This City in 1912.

Does any one know where James J. Grace can be found or have they heard of him in the last three years? Relatives of this man are making every effort to obtain information as to his whereabouts. He was known to have been here in 1912 during the construction of the dam but apparently no one knows where he went from here or what became of him. Information concerning him should be submitted to L. J. Wolf, secretary of the Keokuk Elk, who has been appealed to by a brother Elk to assist in locating the missing man.

Should Amend Law.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] WASHINGTON, July 10.—That congress should amend the federal reserve law as soon as possible, was one of the conclusions drawn today by ex-Congressman Fowler, attorney for labor's peace council from the charges his organization filed Friday with the reserve board.

At present Fowler asserted the law has entirely too many "dangerous teeth" which must be pulled before the country's financial affairs can rest on an honest basis.

But for this law, he said, Morgan and Co., would have lacked the machinery to finance the allies in Europe which the council declares the firm has done.

State's Witness Guarded.

DES MOINES, Ia., July 10.—Telephonic advices from Bedford late yesterday stated that Mrs. Maria Porter, the state's chief witness in the Bedford case, was secretly removed from Quitman, Mo., in order to protect her against possible danger because of her determination to testify at the hearing in Bedford next Tuesday. This action was said to have been taken by representatives of the attorney general's office.

"A month ago a well dressed man who claimed to be representing Bates Huntman, went to Mrs. Porter and tried to get her to leave Quitman," said Attorney Bullman over the phone. "She refused to go. A week ago, he was there again. Evidently he had learned of our investigation. She still refused to go. We will do everything possible to protect Mrs. Porter."

WOMAN IN CASE BEING GUARDED

State's Chief Witness in Bedford, Iowa Sensation Will be Put Under Surveillance of Officers.

IS FOUND IN MISSOURI

She is Mrs. Maria Porter and is Said by Officials in Case to Have Been Witness to Alleged Tragedy.

BEDFORD, Ia., July 10.—With four men under arrest for alleged complicity in the murder of a wealthy stockman and his son at Stam, Iowa, in September, 1888, and arrangements made for the protection of the state's chief witness, representatives of Attorney General Cosson's office yesterday said they were prepared for the next phase of Taylor county's double murder and buried treasure. This, they said, would come Tuesday when the preliminary hearing of the defendants, Bates Huntman, Samuel Scrivner and Henry and John Dameswood, will be called in the local court.

C. A. Robbins, assistant attorney general, left last night for Des Moines for a conference with his chief, Attorney General Cosson, after arrangements had been made to insure the appearance of Mrs. Maria Porter of Quitman, Mo., at the hearing Tuesday. She is the woman, who, as a 14 year old girl, is said to have witnessed the killing of the gentleman believed to have been Nathaniel Smith of St. Joseph, Mo., and his son, and the subsequent burial of \$90,000 on the old Collins farm near Stam.

Samuel Scrivner, the wealthiest man among the defendants, in an interview here yesterday characterized the whole proceedings as a "huge joke."

Another version of the treasure story came to light, when old residents said the money had been buried in the farm by the James boys after they had robbed a bank. This was said to account for their interest in locating it in after years. The loss of the plan in a fire which burned the house on the place and the death of Jonathan Dark, the only member of the gang who knew where it had been buried, it was claimed, made necessary the search that extended through so many years.
