OLDFIELD-RESTA RACE FOR TROPHY

Annual Race of 100 Miles With no More Than Five Entrants Will be Inaugurated.

AUGUST 7 IS DATE SET

Fans Look for Sunbeam's Brookland's Track Record to Fall in Event on Chicago Track.

[Special to The Gate City] CHICAGO, July 24.—Directors of the Speedway Park association were so delighted when Dario Resta, who broke all the world records from 120 miles to 500 miles on their track June 26, and Barney Oldfield, "master driver of the world," selected the Chicago speedway for their match race of 100 miles August 7, they have decided to offer a valuable silver trophy to the winner.

The race will be made an annual challenge affair, although a name for the cup has not been selected. The deed of gift will provide that a permanent possession of the cup may be obtained by anyone winning three times a race on the Chicago track similar to that to be run in August. It has been decided that more than five entries will not be accepted. In case there are more challengers, elimination trials will be held, the five fastest cars being permitted to start. Only five cars may be sent away in one row over the Chicago track with safety. It would be unfair to give any man the advantage at the start in so short a race, according to President David F. Reid of the Speedway association, who formulated the rules.

Cables for New Plugs.

The August race date came as a complete surprise to officials of the speedway association. It grew out of a challenge hurled at Resta and Ralph de Palma by Barney Oldfield after he had given his Delage its first trial on the Windy City oval last Wednesday. The car was purchased by David G. Joyce, Chicago lumberman and sportsman, for the use of the veteran in this country. It was shipped from France more than two weeks ago and although its construction is entirely new, its first trial was so satisfactory Oldfield felt confident he would be able to get more than 105 miles an hour out of it before he had worked on the motor a week. Bad spark plugs prevented him making anything like the speed Resta has been getting out of his Peugeot. He cabled to France for new plugs, however, and when they got here will be able, he said, to give the car almost, if not quite, as much speed as the Italian has shown.

Oldfield made the remark after he finished his trial that he would be delighted to meet Resta and de Palma on a fast speedway, expressing a preference for the Chicago track because of its proven speed capabilities and safety. David F. Reid heard the remark and immediately offered Barney, Resta and any others the use of the track for challenge matches. Barney snapped up his offer immediately. It was agreed that August 7th would be the best date as it would not interfere with the Elgin road races on August 20 and 21.

Friends of Oldfield let it be known in New York that the veteran was anxious to pit the Delage against Resta's Peugeot. A. J. Hill, Resta's manager, heard the report and immediately telegraphed his acceptance of the challenge. Both men will be here for practice and final tuning of their cars August 2nd. President Reid then took the matter up with the speedway directorate. After some discussion it was decided to make the race an annual affair, providing the champions of the country wanted to challenge it was agreed to give a cup emblematic of the championship of the world at 100 miles.

Look for World's Record.

Already fans are beginning to hope the possible speed. It is the universal opinion that the average will run well over 100 miles an hour as Porporato who led at the century mark in the derby of June 26, averaged 99.8 miles an hour for the distance. There were twenty-two cars on the track and Porporato had to make a tire change. It is being argued that with the track entirely free the speed will be greatly increased. Some are inclined to believe the world trial record of 107 miles an hour held by Chassagne of the Sunbeam team on Brooklands may be dropped, although it is said by others that Chassagne's mark was established with none but himself on the track and with a motor nearly twice the size of that carried by Oldfield's Delage or Resta's Peugeot.

The speedway will present a new appearance to visitors who saw the real work of painting the structure will be begun this week and the infield is rapidly being improved. Stone roads are being built around the inside of the track so that it will be possible to park cars even after a severe rainstorm. More than \$100,000 is being spent on improvements. The charge for admission to the match has not been decided on other than it will be low enough to appeal to a popular demand.
