SEVERELY BURNED IN FIRE FRIDAY

Mrs. Mary E. Betts is Victim of Gasoline Stove Accident and Her House is Wrecked by Flames.

NEIGHBOR TO RESCUE

George Glasgow, Who Lives Across the Street, Succeeded in Extinguishing Burning Clothing of Victim.

At midnight last night, reports from the hospital were that Mrs. Betts' condition was regarded as extremely critical. Doubts were expressed as to whether she would be able to live through the night.

Mrs. Mary E. Betts, 1826 High street, was severely burned Friday afternoon when her clothing caught fire from flames from the gasoline stove which had evidently been turned on some time before the torch was applied, and which burst into flames in an instant. George Glasgow, a neighbor living across the street, heard Mrs. Betts' daughter-in-law cry for help, and ran to the aid of Mrs. Betts. By the time he had beaten out the fire in her clothing, the flames had been communicated to the other rooms in the house, and it was badly gutted by fire and water. Other neighbors who responded were Mr. Oliver Hance and Mrs. Daley.

Mrs. Betts was removed to Graham hospital and physicians were summoned. It was found that she was very seriously burned about the arms and legs. The effect of the burns and the shock on her system is feared by her relatives and friends, although hopes are entertained for her recovery. Reports from the hospital were that she spent a fairly satisfactory night, Friday night.

Whether a child who was in the house with Mrs. Betts had turned the burner in the stove, or whether she had inadvertently turned it, is not known. But when Mrs. Betts attempted to light the stove, the torch ignited the gasoline and the flames flared up and caught her clothing. Mrs. Betts is a semi-invalid and was not able to get back from the fire.

George Glasgow lives across the street and he immediately ran to her rescue. He found her clothing was ignited, and it was with considerable difficulty that he succeeded in beating out the fire. He suffered slight burns on his hand as the result of the attempt to aid Mrs. Betts.

House Mass of Flames.

In the meantime the burning gasoline had communicated to the other rooms in the house, and the house was a mass of flames. When the fire department arrived, a line of hose was laid from the hydrant near the Torrence school, but the pressure seemed weak, on account of the distance. The truck was sent to Eleventh and Concert streets, where a line was laid and connected with the pump on the truck. This gave the firemen sufficient pressure as the pump on the truck drew the water out of the mains about as fast as they could be filled.

The house was badly gutted and charred inside and outside because of the start which the flames secured. It was figured that it was almost ten minutes from the time the stove exploded until the alarm was sent in, as Mr. Glasgow was working to save Mrs. Betts, and had no time to either put out the fire in the house or call the fire department for several minutes. This gave the flames a good headway. The alarm was turned in at 5:25 o'clock Friday night.

REJOICES IN VICTORY FOR PYTHIAN HOME

Dr. J. F. Cole of Oelwein Had Been Advocate of Project for Many Years.

Probably the happiest Pythian in Iowa at the close of the grand lodge at Des Moines Thursday was Dr. J. F. Cole, mayor of Oelwein, and past grand chancellor. The cause of Dr. Cole's elation was the fact that the grand lodge had just made provision for the building of a home for widows and orphans of Pythians, an enterprise which he had enthusiastically advocated for the past fifteen years. It is said by his friends that the final victory for the forces in favor of building a home was due in no small degree to his persistent efforts.

Threat to Destroy Ship.

United Press Leased Wire Service.—HOUSTON, Texas, Aug. 7.—Twenty-four hours after his rejection by the United States marine corps recruiting office, William Hugo Hayssen, an Alabamian, was placed under arrest here and is held in connection with telephoned threats to blow up the home of William Vetherford, manager of a cotton export firm, active also in shipping horses to the allies. Hayssen has made no statement.

He had a passport issued in February and signed by Wm. J. Bryan, identifying him as a war correspondent enroute for Germany. Whetherford received three warnings, the last being "if that load of horses leaves Galveston next Saturday the ship will be blown up and your house, too."

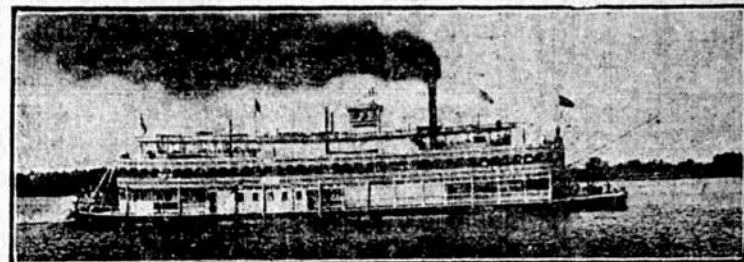
