THE FIRST GAME GOES 7-4

Error Paves Way to Keokuk Win—Second Won on Consecutive Singles in First Round.

[Special to The Gate City.] CLINTON, Iowa, Aug. 23.—The Indians from Keokuk romped on the Clinton Pilots for sure on Sunday, and made up for Saturday's defeat by taking both games, winning the first, which was a miserable contest, by the score of 7 to 4 and taking the second by a score of 1 to 0 in a well-played game.

Clinton drove Cooper, ex-Pilot, to cover at the end of the fourth frame of the first game. Penner, who took up the twirling for the Indians in the fifth, was just about right only one hit being registered off him during the rest of the game.

Keokuk opened fast, two errors by Ellison, a single, triple and sacrifice giving them three runs. Three more were scored in the fifth when three singles and errors by Ellison and Link came in the seventh when Lowther lifted the ball over the fence for a home run.

Clinton counted one in the first when Kessel was walked and took third on Griffin's error of Milligan's chance. Evans hit one to Swick, who fumbled and then threw the ball away, Kessel scoring.

Keokuk scored on the only run of the second game on two singles and a sacrifice in the first inning.

DAILY STOCK LETTER.

[Copyright 1915 by the New York Evening Post.] NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—At the opening prices advanced; this was apparently because of a baseless story that the German government had apologized for the Arabs. In the swift decline which followed, under what seemed to be heavy realizing sales, including a good many from Europe, prices broke one to nine points, with the greatest weakness in the speculative intervals, but with the railway shares participating in the movement. After an hour of this decline, the market turned abruptly and retraced its downward steps; the buying at this time coming apparently in very large measure from the outside public. When the market in the final hour, had largely returned to last week's closing prices, or higher, Wall street was filled with reports that Berlin was denying the statement that the Arab had been sunk by a submarine, and on these reports circulation in various versions, the movement of recovery grew more active. In this mood, the market closed; with the speculative contingent in a bewildered and perhaps slightly hysterical state of mind.
