START ON REPAIR OF CAR TRACKS

Keokuk Electric Company Begins Work on Franklin Street Between Twelfth and Thirteenth.

The Keokuk Electric company started work today on the repairing of the street car track on Franklin street between Twelfth and Thirteenth streets. The track will be taken up and relaid on new ties and a six inch rock ballast.

After work has been completed on this block, Franklin street between Seventh and Ninth streets, and Fourth street between Ninth and Fulton will be improved in the same manner. The curve just to the rear of the depot on Exchange street, has been repaired now, and when the work now being started is completed, the street railway system will be in an excellent condition.
