cause he so eloquently advocates, the Amsterdam correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph wired today. The German government considers the Arabie incident closed and has declared its willingness to blame the submarine commander when he returns, continued the correspondent. There is considerable bitterness in military circles on account of the chancellor's so-called weakness toward the United States and consequently some ill-feeling toward America.

[The Berlin bureau of the United Press cabled yesterday that it was reported there Bryan intended to visit Europe on a peace mission. At Winona Lake, Ind., Bryan made this comment: "I have no intention whatever of going to Europe. I have plans made to deliver addresses in this country. There is absolutely nothing to the report."]

DEATH OF WARSAW RESIDENT SUNDAY

Funeral of Mrs. Hannah Kreipke Held This Afternoon in Neighboring Town.

STOLE SUIT OF CLOTHES OFF LINE

George Ray, sixteen year old wanderer, Carried Off Suit Belonging to Andy Anderson.

WAS CAUGHT BY POLICE

Sentence Suspended When the Lad Promised to go to Grandmother's Home Down in Quincy.

George Ray, a sixteen year old wanderer from Quincy, while passing in the vicinity of Fifteenth and High streets, admired a coat and pair of trousers belonging to Andy Anderson, 1508 High street, which were hanging on a line at the back of his house. These he secured.

Later he was taken up by the police on the charge of petty larceny, and when arraigned in Justice Leindecker's court this morning, was given thirty days in the county jail. This sentence was suspended, however, on his promise to return to Quincy, where his grandmother lives.

When taken, Ray was wearing the trousers and he directed the officers where to go to get the coat, which he had hidden in some weeds on an empty lot near the scene of the larceny.

He told the police this morning that his mother and father had started some time back on a wagon journey to Chicago, and had left him behind. He had been living with his grandmother in Quincy, but made occasional excursions to other near cities.

Ray Hornung was charged with drunkenness in Justice Leindecker's court this morning, and was fined \$3.55. This he paid. He was released. Henry Mink, another plain drunk, was given five days in the county jail when he could not pay a fine of \$20.

deputation of miners' officials and coal operators will be submitted to the miners' delegates for formal ratification at Cardiff tomorrow.

NO PEACE TALK. LONDON, Aug. 31.—Despite the latest alleged German "peace feelers," the United Press is able to state on the best of authority that the peace situation, so far as England is concerned, has undergone no recent change.

A few socialist leaders favor the ending of hostilities. But neither in official circles or in the great mass of the public, is there any inclination to accept any peace at this time, honorable or otherwise. England is determined that the strength of her new armies shall be felt by the enemy and that the Germans must be driven out of France and Belgium.

[In view of the revival of peace talk at Washington, based on hints contained in official statements from European capitals, the United Press yesterday cabled its London bureau for an authoritative statement of England's present attitude toward peace discussions. The above London dispatch is the reply.]

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, Aug. 31.—Wheat: was sharply lower today on the fine weather predicted for the next few days and on the report of a local house that despite big damage to crops recently, all records would be broken for crops this year. Prices at opening were down 1/4, 1/2 and 1/4, to 95, 98 and 97 1/2 for September, December and May respectively. Selling later caused further recessions of 1/4 and 1/4, below opening prices.

Corn was lower with wheat, the weather and considerable selling being partly responsible. Oats were firm, due to a strong buying movement.
