WANTS MONEY BACK PAID FOR LIQUOR

Mrs. Edward Caloway Alleges Intoxicants Sold by Brewing Company, Was in Violation of State Law.

MANY DIVORCE ACTIONS

Seven Suits Were Filed Today in Which Cruelty Was Main Allegation—Was Last Day for Filing.

Today was the last day for the filing of suits for the September term docket, and as usual there was a large batch of petitions filed at the eleventh hour. Judgments from the number of suits filed previously, together with those filed today, the divorce mill in the district court is going to have a busy time at this term. Seven divorce cases were filed this morning.

Cordelia Caloway, executrix of the estate of Edward Caloway, has filed suit against Popel and Gillis Brewing company, asking judgment for \$3,000. In her petition Mrs. Caloway alleges that Popel and Gillis sold to Edward Caloway, plaintiff's intestate, intoxicating liquors, wines, beer and whiskey to the amount of \$3,000. These sales, it is alleged, were in violation of title 12, chapter 6, of the Iowa code. It is further alleged that the money paid by Caloway was received by the defendants in violation of law and was retained under an agreement to pay back to Caloway. This, it is alleged, was not done.

Cruelty Popular Allegation. Lutie Conley McComas asks divorce from William W. McComas, alleging cruelty and inhuman treatment.

H. Josephine Sibbach filed suit for divorce from George W. Sibbach, alleging cruelty and inhuman treatment and desertion.

Bessie Myrtle Danough asks for divorce from Thomas Olney Danough, alleging cruelty and inhuman treatment. Habitual drunkenness and desertion are allegations in divorce petition filed by Mary J. Whalen against John Whalen. She asks for custody of children.

In her petition for divorce, in which she alleged cruel and inhuman treatment, Kathryn Lydia Gilmors alleges that her husband, A. M. Gilmors, threw a clock at her.

Alice Miller has filed suit for divorce against Thomas S. Miller. She alleges habitual drunkenness as the grounds. She asks for custody of children and \$4 per week for maintenance.

Other Suits Filed. Schouten Bakery Co., Inc. has filed suit against B. F. Guy, B. B. Hardin, James H. Crump and E. H. Tinscher, in which it is alleged that rent to the amount of \$273.98 is due company for building at Tenth and Johnson street. Judgment for this amount is asked.

Thomas Floyd Jones asks judgment for \$300 against John S. Moore and Phoebe L. Moore, alleged to be due on promissory note.

A. T. Reining asks judgment against George Well and Ernestine Well for \$1,944.69. This amount is alleged to be due on promissory note given Amelia Reining which has been transferred to A. T. Reining.

The Lagomarcino-Grupe Co. has filed suit against City Drug store and W. Frank Brown, asking judgment for \$148.40 alleged to be due on bill of goods sold.

The September term of court will open at Keokuk Monday, Sept. 20, with Judge W. S. Hamilton presiding. The term opens next Monday at Fort Madison with Judge Henry Bank presiding. The petit jurors are ordered to report a week later in each term.
