

# CLEO ROSS HELD ON A SERIOUS CHARGE

Sadie Deck Gives Testimony Before the Federal Grand Jury at Quincy, On Relations With Man.

## PROMISED TO MARRY HER

Keokuk Girl Met Ross But Recently in This City—Returns to Keokuk With Mother.

Cleo Ross of Quincy was indicted by a federal grand jury at Quincy yesterday, charged with violation of the Mann act. The indictment followed the testimony of Miss Sadie Deck, the Keokuk girl involved in the case. Miss Deck gave some startling evidence before the grand jury, according to the following story which was printed in this morning's Quincy Whisk:

"Laying bare the immoral life lived by herself and Cleo Ross, Sadie Deck, arrested here Wednesday night by the police on complaint of her mother, yesterday told the federal grand jury a history of her connections with Ross, and declared that he had deluded her to believe that he was unmarried, that he cared for her, that unless she would marry him he would jump in the Mississippi river and end it all.

"After the girl had told her story to the grand jury and had sworn what she declared was every detail of the entire affair, an indictment was returned against Ross, holding him under the provisions of the Mann white slave act.

Met Ross Only Recently. "The girl declared that one week ago last Monday, in Keokuk, she was introduced to Ross by a man named Stanley Jackson and they wanted to take her on an automobile ride. She answered that it was too late then and on the following Thursday night, one week ago last night, they came and the plans for the ride were carried out.

"Ross was introduced to her as a single man and when they took the automobile ride, he was accompanied by a girl named Hazel Carle. The party drove to Fort Madison, Iowa, and on the return trip Jackson demanded that the girls have improper relations with the men, or walk home, but Ross, the witness declared, turned on Jackson and stated that the car was his, that the girls could ride in his car without being interfered with. They took seats beside Ross and continued on their trip home to Keokuk. It rained during the night and the automobile skidded from one side of the road to another and when they arrived home, after having to stop

many times, it was 4 o'clock in the morning.  
Threatens Leap in River. "On their arrival home Ross asked the Deck girl to accompany him to Quincy, that they might be married, declaring that if she refused he would jump into the Mississippi river and this, the witness declared, in the presence of the Carle girl. The girl agreed and when they arrived in Quincy Tuesday of this week he proposed that they continue to Hannibal and be married there. It was agreed and they drove to Hannibal. Twice they met acquaintances of Ross on the trip and each time he introduced the Deck girl as his wife. They arrived in Hannibal Tuesday and he registered them at the Mark Twain hotel as Mr. and Mrs. Ross.  
"They stayed there all that night and it was there they had the immoral relations on which the white slave charge is based. They returned to Quincy Wednesday, registered at the Occidental hotel as Mr. and Mrs. Ross and here the story ends with the arrest of the couple, with one exception.  
"That exception is that the man absented himself from the room of the hotel after arriving here. The girl declares he promised to marry her when they arrived in Hannibal, but changed his mind there and wanted to return here to have the ceremony performed, but once here he

wanted to continue on to Burlington, where he said he has relatives, to have the knot tied.  
Will Be Taken Back to Pontiac. "Ross was held a prisoner in the city jail all day yesterday awaiting afternoon and took charge of her state reform school at Pontiac where he will be held until the federal courts get rid of his case. It is likely that his future residence will be at Leavenworth, Kan., for a term of from one to ten years in the federal prison.  
"The Deck girl's mother and aunt came down from Keokuk yesterday afternoon and took charge of her. They were with her when she appeared before the federal grand jury yesterday afternoon and took her back to Keokuk on the evening train last night.  
"Ross has been going fast. "For the last several months Ross has been travelling a fast gait in this and other cities. The grand jury was fast for him, however, and the end came with a sudden crash, like it has for many others who have attempted the fast and furious pace—the pace that kills.  
"Since his wedding to Miss Agnes White, a member of an old and prominent family of this city, several months ago, he has been well supplied with money and has tried to show that he was a good fellow and was a prince among the fast ones. Since his wedding, it is said that he has been the owner of three automobiles. Soon after their wedding, his wife presented him with an automobile and they took a trip in it to Chicago. After they were there a few days, it is claimed, Ross sent his wife home and essayed to take in the sights of the big city with some young women friends whom he had met there. The funds on hand, however, did not last very long and the story goes that he sold the machine that had been presented him for \$1,000. When a part of this money was spent he again concluded that he wanted another automobile and he turned to his wife for its purchase, but before he could return to Quincy he is said to have completely wrecked the machine in Chicago. Since his return a third auto, a big Cadillac eight, came in his possession and it was in this that he is said to have taken Miss Deck on a trip through Missouri, Illinois and Iowa during the present week.

To Get Taxicab Line. "Some time ago Ross is said also to have decided that he wanted to go into business and attempted to buy out a local taxicab line. In this he failed and he then turned his head toward Keokuk where he is said to have gone to negotiate the purchase of a taxicab line when he met Miss Deck.  
"Money and automobiles are not the only things that have led to young Ross' downfall, through the generosity of his young wife, whom he is said to have sadly neglected through his desire for adventure, but diamonds, too, have taken an important part. He became the possessor of a number of valuable stones during the last few months and he is understood to have told an attorney at police headquarters that he pawned three stones worth \$1,800 in Keokuk during his last trip there.  
"When he was arrested Wednesday night by Chief Koch and Detective Scharnhorst he is said to have offered each of the officers a diamond ring and \$250 in cash if they would allow him to leave the city and report to the Deck girl's mother that she could not be found.

Had Been Resident of Keokuk for Many Years—Funeral to be Held Tomorrow Afternoon.

## WAS BORN IN VIRGINIA

Is Survived by Husband, Son and Daughter, Two Brothers and By Two Sisters.

Mrs. Mary Daugherty, wife of Lemuel Daugherty, passed away at the family home, 314 Times street, yesterday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. Mrs. Daugherty had been in poor health for some time and death was the result of a gradual decline. Her many friends and acquaintances in the city and vicinity have received the news of her death with regret, for she was a woman whose kindly disposition and quiet ways attracted many to her during her long residence in this city.  
The decedent was born in the state of Virginia in the year 1847, being sixty-eight years old at the time of her death.  
When she was eighteen years of age she moved with her parents to Keokuk and had resided here ever since. Her maiden name was Mary Crowl and she was married to Lemuel Daugherty here in 1871. Mr. Daugherty survives with a son and daughter.
