# NOTED SOCIOLOGIST WOULD BUILD UP SUPERMAN RACE WITH EUGENICS

Establishment of a "eugenics registry," the purpose of which would be development of an "aristocracy of health" and the creation of beings possessed of superior characteristics of mind and body, was advocated by Dr. J. H. Kellogg of the Battle Creek Sanitarium, Battle Creek, Mich., before the conference on race betterment at the Panama-Pacific exposition.

"The establishment of a registry for horses created a famous breed of English thoroughbreds," he said. "The object sought by the proposed eugenics registry is to accomplish for humans the same marvelous transformation, and to evolve the same betterments that have been and still are being accomplished for pigs and cattle. We have created wonderful new species of domestic animals. Why not have a new and improved species of man?"

"The object of a eugenics registry is to create an aristocracy of health. The world needs new aristocracy; not an artificial, blue blooded aristocracy created by wealth or official authority, but a real aristocracy made up of Apollos and Venuses and their fortunate progeny.

"Instead of such an aristocracy we are actually building up an aristocracy of lunatics, idiots, paupers, and

criminals. These unfit persons already have reached the proportions of a vast multitude—500,000 lunatics, 80,000 criminals, 100,000 paupers, 90,000 idiots, 90,000 epileptics—and we are supporting these defectives in idleness like royal aristocrats, at an expense of \$100,000,000 a year."

## Hon. Elihu Root On Woman's Sphere

The question of Woman Suffrage is an issue before the American people. Twelve states have adopted it, four more states vote upon it this fall and it is strongly urged that it become a platform demand of the national political parties. It is therefore the privilege and the duty of every voter to study carefully this subject. Hon. Elihu Root, in discussing this question before the constitutional convention of New York, recently said in part:

"I am opposed to the granting of suffrage to women, because I believe that it would be a loss to women, to all women and to every woman; and because I believe it would be an injury to the state, and to every man and every woman in the state. It would be useless to argue over whether woman suffrage were a natural right. If it were a natural right, then women should have it though the heavens fall. But if there is any one thing settled in the long discussion of this subject, it is that suffrage is not a natural right, but is simply a means of government, and the sole question to be discussed is whether government by the suffrage of men and women will be better government than by the suffrage of men alone.

"Into my judgment, sir, there enters no element of the inferiority of woman. It is not that woman is inferior to man, but it is that woman is different from man; that in the distribution of powers, of capacities, of qualities, our Maker has created man adapted to the performance of certain functions in the economy of nature and society, and woman adapted to the performance of other functions.

"Woman rules today by the sweet and noble influences of her character. Put woman into the arena of conflict and she abandons these great weapons which control the world, and she takes into her hands, feeble and nerveless for strife, weapons with which she is unfamiliar and which she is unable to wield. Woman in strife becomes hard, harsh, unlovable, repulsive; as far removed from that gentle creature to whom we all owe allegiance and to whom we confess submission, as the heaven is removed from the earth.

"The whole science of government is the science of protecting life and liberty and the pursuit of happiness. In the divine distribution of powers, the duty and the right of protection rests with the male. It is so throughout nature. It is so with men, and I, for one, will never consent to part with the divine right of protecting my wife, my daughter, the women whom I love, and the women whom I respect, exercising the birthright of man, and place that high duty in the weak and nerveless hands of those designed by God to be protected rather than to engage in the stern warfare of government. In my judgment, this whole movement arises from a false conception of the duty and of the right of both men and women.

"The time will never come when the line of demarcation between the functions of the two sexes will be broken down. I believe it to be false philosophy; I believe that it is an attempt to turn backward upon the line of social development, and that if the step ever be taken, we go centuries backward on the march towards a higher, nobler and purer civilization, which must be found not in the confusion, but in the higher differentiation of the sexes."

# LIGHTNING HIT CHURCH STEEPLE

Bolt Crashed Through Window on One Side and Came Out of Another, During the Storm.

## NEW GLASS UNTOUCHED

During the Summer, Another Window Was Blown Out by the Wind and Fell With a Crash.

The steeple of the Unitarian church at Fourth and High streets seems to be marked by storms this season. A bolt of lightning struck the base of the steeple near the church roof Friday afternoon during the storm, the bolt entering the medallion facing Main street and coming out of the medallion facing Fifth street, evidently circling around inside the steeple. Earlier in the season during a wind storm the medallion facing Fourth street was torn out and fell to the walk in ruins.

Each of these medallions in the steeple is six feet in diameter. There is not a mark on the steeple except at the lower half of the medallion facing Main street and on the Fifth street side. Bricks are torn out, evidently where the bolt hit. Bricks are torn out of the side towards Fifth street, giving rise to the belief that the lightning was playing one of its peculiar freaks during the Friday afternoon storm. One of the panes of glass in the High street medallion is shattered, but no bricks are knocked out. Glass was also shattered in the medallions on the north and west sides of the steeple, but the newly placed one on the Fourth street side was not harmed.

## ALGERIANS NOT ALL ARABS

Two Kabyles, While They Are Followers of Islam, Have Different Characteristics.

I have spoken of Algeria as if it consisted entirely of Arabs; but this may give an entirely false idea of the population and characteristics of the country. For though they are all followers of Islam they do not belong to the same race. Roughly there are two great races in Algeria, the Arabs properly so-called, and the Kabyles.

The Kabyles are a curious race, so different from the Arabs as to suggest an entirely different origin. Some people even insist that they are largely of that Roman race which for so long was master of all North Africa. Their language is quite different from Arabic; though they are Moslems, their conception of Mohammedanism is so different from those of the Arabs that they may well be considered heretics, and their racial characteristics are even more different than their blood and their creed from those of the Arab population.

The Arab is lazy, the Kabyle is industrious. The Arab is a spendthrift, the Kabyle is thrifty. The Arab is more reactionary than the Kabyle. It is evident that the French will have a less difficult problem in assimilating the Kabyle than in assimilating the Arab.—T. P. O'Connor in T. P.'s Weekly.

# EXTRAVAGANCE GETS A BLOW

Women of England Have Formed a League to Teach the People to Make Sacrifices.

## ISSUE A PROCLAMATION

Ladies of Rank and Actresses Start Movement Which Will Have Good Results.

[By Wilbur S. Forrest, United Press Staff Correspondent.] LONDON, Aug. 23. (By mail.)—While the government is dining into the ears of the people the vital need of wartime economy, London today saw the creation of a nation-wide movement to forewarn England's titled women to forswear extravagance.

Scores of these women will, in consequence of the birth of the "Women's War Economy League," avoid all that seems of luxury and, among other things, scorn the tempting frills of new fashions.

Such members of the nobility of the Countesses of Yarborough and Pembroke, Duchesses of Sutherland and Beaufort, Viscountess Ridley, Cornelia Lady Wimborne and others, head the league. They are pledged to exert the fullest degree of economy, not only by application of it to their own households, but to influence their friends and dependants. Thousands and tens of thousands of women throughout Britain are expected to follow the aristocratic lead.

Queen Mary and Alexandra are said to be closely identified with the movement.

During war, frills and fashion that associate with aristocracy will be tabooed. Nineteen fifteen model frocks and hats will remain with social leaders and their followers if the war lasts ten years.

Social functions which have been curtailed to a certain degree during the war will be further curtailed. Members of the league are pledged to give up all entertaining either at home or in public and to restrict the consumption of food to the lowest possible limit.

In a striking manifesto issued by the league it is set forth that women of the nation, regardless of social standing, must realize that victory in the present struggle depends on the willingness to bear privation and practice self denial at home as well as in the field.

The proclamation adds: "We are induced to this course because we firmly believe the issues of this war are such that the happiness and well-being of both our own and future generations are at stake. A failure to win a complete victory would mean defeat of civilization and of christianity itself and we know that victory can only be achieved if the spirit of the country is aroused and made to express itself in practical and well considered effort.

"The example must be set by those who have the widest margin of the essentials of life.

"The first badge—the official insignia of the league—was issued to Lady Wimborne who is the mother of Lord Wimborne, lord-lieutenant of Ireland. Others who have signed the pledge and received the badge are the marchioness of Tullibardine, the countess of Mar and Kellie, Lady DeRamsay and Lady Islington.

"We have hopes of active support in most influential quarters," said Lady Juliet Duff, one of the honorable secretaries of the league, today. "We are hoping to enlist the sympathy and active help of women's societies, suffrage, anti-suffrage and the rest without distinction of creed or social position."

Among the first of the non-titled elements to join the league are several of the leading actresses of England who have instituted a campaign of their own to minimize dress extravagance on the stage. This side campaign is regarded as extremely beneficial to the cause because of the fact that thousands of women pattern their new frocks and gowns from those they see at the musical comedies.

A most ardent supporter of economy is Mrs. Despard, sister of Field Marshal Sir John French, who advocates two course dinners in every home of the land during the war.

Woman is the domestic chancellor of the exchequer, declared Mrs. Despard, in an interview today. She advocated the formation of societies of housewives in every city, town and village in the British Isles, whereby the housewife might be instructed how to make a penny take the place of two.

The Women's War Economy league will not only extend its activities to women, it was learned today. Its influence will "work" on the men in the direction of less consumption of liquor, tobacco and other kindred diversions.
