

HAVE SETTLED DOWN TO GREAT BATTLE. (Continued from page 1.) that Roumania is about to mobilize. The allies are fully prepared to meet this new situation. In some quarters here it is not believed the Austro-Germans plan to fight their way to Constantinople. Three hundred thousand troops have been massed along the Serbian frontier, but this force is inadequate for such an expedition. Some well-informed diplomats think the Austro-German neutrals is merely to terrorize the Balkan neutrals into submission to any scheme for the relief of the Turks that the Germans may devise.

Progress Blocked. LONDON, Oct. 1.—Heavy German counter attack have again blocked the progress of the French in the Champagne region, this afternoon's communique from the French war office indicates. Paris, however, claims that the

French continue to make progress west of Vimy, though no claims of large successes are made. The Kaiser evidently has thrown more reinforcements into this line both before the Bazancourt-Challerange railway and in the Vimy-Lens region. All the German attacks have broken down, the French war office declares.

There are indications that the Germans are planning a counter offensive at some spot in the battle line, now inactive, with the object of drawing off the allies from the Vimy and Champagne fronts.

Two clerks were reported overcome today from the strain. A governor of the stock exchange said, however, that it would be almost impossible to close tomorrow as the whole world is trading in this market.

Henry Clews, a veteran of the street, declared this afternoon the market was booming for two reasons. "Everybody wants to buy stocks and this demand is sending prices soaring," said Clews. "People believe that after the war is over, this country will see a big industrial boom."

"Added to this, the big interests are in a strong position. The new banking laws have set up a safeguard against panics and the banks are bursting with heavy deposits. People are spending less money. This has greatly increased the funds in savings and general banks which has made money for investors plentiful."

"Merchants throughout the country are just beginning to realize that we are now on the edge of an era of prosperity. Our exports are larger than at any time in the history of the country and the half billion dollar loan to the allies will even increase this country's exports."

"Million share days on the stock exchange and a half billion dollar loan show how freely money is being spent here, but as it is all staying in the country, American business men are the ones who are being benefited."

Big traders in Westinghouse watched that stock jump to a new high price at 132 1/2 in mid-afternoon and those who sold earlier in the day, believing it had reached its turning point, made frantic attempts to buy back the stock. Westinghouse strength was due to reports of new war orders received by that company.

OVERCOME BY THE BIG BUSINESS

Wall Street Clerks are Being Driven to the Limit During the Excitement. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—Wall street is beginning to "crack under the strain" of the almost unprecedented trading of the past week. Several commission houses suggested that a vacation be taken tomorrow to permit overworked clerks to catch up with clerical work resulting from the million share days.

The British Republic. Springfield, Mass., Republican. An American newspaper correspondent who was lately detained for investigation at a British post was asked by a puzzled admiral why he wanted to go to Germany. Didn't the American people credit the British reports? asked the admiral of the Danish captain of the ship, who took his passenger's part. "Why should they?" blurted the correspondent and after some hesitation the correspondent was allowed to go on his way. There is indeed no reason why we should give unlimited credit to reports from any of the belligerent countries. No doubt the British admiral was quite sincere in thinking that a statement from a British source ought to carry conviction, and that mendacity is to be looked for in statements from German sources. But to neutrals both sources are tainted because both are partisan.

If the British censorship could realize that a story from one side carries little weight till the other side is heard it would modify its restrictions. To keep German news bottled up is impossible, and even the slightest suspicion of its being edited in transmission carries the impression that England is afraid of the truth, which is by no means the case. A blundering censorship may easily make the world think that ugly facts are being systematically concealed.
