

GIRL THROWN FROM AUTO IN COLLISION

Street Car Hits Rear Left Wheel of Automobile at Ninth and Main Streets, Yesterday Afternoon.

INJURIES NOT SERIOUS

Six Occupants of Car Escape—Statement of the Motorman Concerning the Accident.

An automobile driven by Mrs. John Brassil of 624 Palean street, collided with an east bound street car at the east corner of Ninth and Main streets at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon...

The car was occupied by Mrs. Brassil, her small son William, Miss Mary Brassil, Miss Rose Welsh and Mr. and Mrs. Clay Bryan of 417 Des Moines street.

The automobile was struck by street car No. 5 which was running between the cemetery and the park. The motorman on the car was Fern Miles and the conductor Bert Phillips.

The automobile cleared the track at Ninth and Main streets on the east side of Ninth all but the rear left wheel. The car struck this and completely turned the auto around. The shock of the collision threw Miss Welsh out, Mrs. Brassil claims that the street car gave no warning signal with the bell and that it was moving at a rapid rate of speed.

The motorman in his official report to the Keokuk Electric company, stated that when he reached the west side of Ninth and Main streets he saw the automobile just at the entrance of Main street on the right side of Ninth street.

TELLS HOW KEOKUK MAN KILLED SELF

Boise Paper Gives Particulars Concerning Suicide of Harry Johnson, Young Colored Man.

HE USED A BELT STRAP

Was Suffering From Tremens and Had Requested That He Be Locked up Until Better.

That Harry Johnson, the young Keokuk colored man who killed himself in Boise a couple of weeks ago, was suffering from tremens, is the information contained in the Evening Capital News of September 27, a copy of which reached here Saturday. Here is the story from the Boise paper:

Harry Johnson, colored, committed suicide in the city jail early this morning while suffering from delirium tremens caused from protracted drunkenness. Johnson, after making the night hideous for several hours with his screams and horrified yells, finally ended his sufferings by removing his belt, making a noose of the buckle end and tying the other around a top bar of his cell, which he reached by standing on the iron bunk fastened to the wall, and jumping off. He strangled to death. His body was discovered about 3:30 o'clock this morning dangling in the air, his feet not over eight inches from the floor. Coroner Summers, who was immediately notified, cut down the body and took it to the morgue. He is of the opinion that Johnson had been dead about half an hour when he took the body down and as the case was so plainly one of self-destruction, he does not propose to hold an inquest unless one is demanded.

Johnson was in bad condition yesterday and twice wanted to be locked up because he felt someone was after him. Last night he again appeared at headquarters and asked for a bed and was placed in a cell. For hours he was noisy. He tore up a mattress, broke a pitcher in the jail and made evidence in the jail this morning showed he had attempted to hang himself with his shirt which he wore and with which he succeeded in accomplishing his purpose.

Johnson was quite well known in Boise. He at one time worked in the Pacific barber shop as porter but for some time has worked for the Sol Neuman wholesale liquor company and has also helped out as extra waiter at the Commercial club on special occasions. When not under the influence of liquor he was a jolly colored man and always ready to joke. He was about forty years of age and is survived by his wife in Portland and his mother in the east. The body is at the Schreiber & Sidenfaden morgue and no funeral arrangements have been made.

Mail Order House Menace.
Donnellson Review: Petitions are being circulated over the state to be presented to the congressman, when signed, asking them to support resolution File No. 5308, presented by W. H. Heinbockel in congress which requires that all mail order houses be taxed by the counties in which they sell their merchandise. The bill if passed would compel the mail order houses taking the year 1914 as an average, to pay each county in Iowa, \$100,000, and in other states would mean \$108,900. The movement is a good one, and everyone should sign it and the congressman should vote for it.
