### TO DECIDE ON THE REVIVAL QUESTION

Meeting Next Thursday Evening at the Y. M. C. A. Building to be for Purpose of Taking Definite Stand.

### COMMITTEE IN MEETING

Evangelistic Body Set Date at Session Held Last Night—Hamilton is Ready to Come.

It will be definitely decided on next Thursday evening if Keokuk is to have an evangelistic campaign next year. A meeting of laymen and church members interested in the matter will be held on that evening at the Y. M. C. A. This was decided at a session of the evangelistic committee last night. This committee, composed of Rev. E. LeRoy Steffey, Rev. H. B. McElree, Harvey Bonham, C. S. Townsend and E. L. Aldrich, decided that the matter should be left in the hands of those interested in the campaign and another banquet, such as was served on Friday evening to seventy-five when Dr. John S. Hamilton was here, will be enjoyed preceding the business meeting.

Everybody seems to be in favor of an evangelistic campaign and it is believed that the proposition will be unanimously approved next Thursday evening. It will also be decided whether or not to secure the services of Dr. Hamilton. All who heard him last Thursday night were struck with his appearance and his address. Dr. Hamilton is about thirty-five years of age, tall and athletic, a man whose very appearance seems to put life into his words.

The pastors of the city have been requested to announce from their pulpits this morning and evening the laymen's conference for next Thursday. A large representation from Keokuk churches is wanted to decide the two important questions to come up.

If it is decided to conduct a revival here next year and Dr. Hamilton is chosen as the leader, then a new executive committee will be appointed to arrange for the carrying out of the plans of the evangelist. Dr. Hamilton will be free the latter part of February and has agreed to come here if he is wanted.

### AMATEUR WEATHER PROPHETS ARE BUSY

They Can't be Content With This Fine Variety But Have to Worry About Winter.

Some people are always borrowing trouble. Here we have the finest fall weather ever experienced anywhere on the globe. The kind of weather that would help the boosters of southern California to draw another 100,000 Iowans to California. Of course, we are going to have some winter. The weather prophets of the old school have supplemented this with the tradition that if the leaves all come down together so that the lawn has to be raked only once it is a sign of a hard winter. This is the way the leaves come down this fall. Ergo, lay in a supply of cough syrup and hunt up your ear muffs.

Hunters say that the fur of the animals is thick this fall, which, according to the Indian prophets, is another sign of cold times coming. Longfellow tells in "Evangeline" how the Indians said that "cold would the winter be, or something like that. Domestic animals are said to be also laying in extra heavy coats.

The women are putting on furs this fall, too, but fashions are ordinarily supposed to be sporadic arrangements in no way governed by the outer atmosphere. Witness the muffer epidemic last summer. And anyway how are fur-edged rooses on a hat going to protect the wearer from the wintry blasts?

Heavy rain during the summer is also an indication of severe winter weather, according to another Indian tradition. And there was plenty of rain last summer. This is said to be an indication of snow, also, so be ready to take your morning exercise this winter in shoveling the walks.

Some of the more sophisticated are not inclined to take stock in the heavy fall of leaves as an indication of an old-fashioned winter. They say that all it takes to make the leaves come down in a cloud is one heavy frost at the critical time. However, those persons who have lived most of their lives in northern Illinois are of the opinion that the winter will be cold enough in any event.

### PROMISING LIFE ENDED BY DEATH

James Gilbert Eagan Passed Away Friday Evening After An Illness of Five Weeks' Duration.

### HARD BLOW TO FAMILY

For Second Time In Three Months, Family Circle is Invaded by Death—Burial Will be Monday.

James Gilbert Eagan, 17 years old, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. James H. Eagan of 1610 Orleans avenue, died Friday evening at 6:15 o'clock. His death occurred at St. Joseph's hospital, where five weeks ago he was taken for an operation for an acute case of appendicitis. Complications set in, and his death was due to an abscess of the liver. His loss will be keenly felt, not only in the family circle, now so cruelly broken but among his wide circle of friends who knew him and who loved him for his sunny disposition and his bright, happy manner.

James Gilbert Eagan was born in Keokuk on March 23, 1898. He was educated in the parochial school of St. Francis de Sales church, and later in the public schools of the city. He was a bright boy and had a splendid future before him. He was employed with the Stone and Webster Engineering corporation on some construction work here and at Fort Madison. During the early part of this year he was working with the Perkins engineering corps on the Green Bay drainage project, and later came back to Keokuk to re-enter the employ of the Consumers' Wholesale Supply company, where he was working at the time he became ill.

Decedent was a member of St. Francis de Sales Catholic church. He was always a faithful attendant at services here, and tried to live an honest and moral life. As a boy he served faithfully in various capacities at the altar, and in his daily life he tried to live as he had been taught both at home and by the church.

### Just Entering Young Manhood.

James Eagan was just entering into his young manhood, and life seemed to bear much of promise for him. He had the enthusiasm of the young man, and this, coupled with his sunny disposition, his ever ready sense of humor, the gentleness and the kindness of a mother's heart made him a boy whom to know was to love. He was bright and cheerful and he made friends easily. His future was sure to be a bright one, his friends all said, and he gave every promise of fulfilling their expectations.

Death, cold and relentless, has blighted his future just as the bud was opening into the flower, but even death in all of its power, cannot take away from his friends and his family the pride which they have a right to feel in the upright life which he lived, and in the memories which they may cherish of a life which, short as it was, was filled with sunshine and with kindness.

The death of young James Eagan comes as a particularly sad one, since it makes the second break in a family circle where love and affection were paramount. The wets all week, appealed to a men's mass meeting here tonight to discuss the democratic party from the liquor interests and to "oust from the state a force that always worked harm to individuals and society." Under the auspices of the Anti-saloon league, Bryan toured the state on the "grape juice special," addressing over 200,000 persons in fifty towns and cities. The dries had other oratorical guns trained against "the enemy," including Richmond P. Hobson.

This year's fight, the fourth attempt to make Ohio dry, has been the hardest yet. To win, the dries must overcome the wet vote in Cincinnati and Cleveland. These cities turned the tide against prohibition in 1914 by \$5,900. In Cincinnati, a great demonstration was held in favor of saloons. Today ten thousand Cleveland school children paraded in a final plea against saloons.

Despite the fight made by the anti-liquor forces, it is believed that when the state amendment prohibiting the sale of intoxicating beverages is submitted to the voters Tuesday, it will fail.
