URGE PRECAUTION IN POSTOFFICE

Bulletin Issued by Department Cautions Postal Officials to be on Guard Against Robberies.

URGE SMALLER AMOUNTS

Second, Third and Fourth Class Offices Asked to Limit Their Supplies of Stamps Kept in Office.

Postmasters throughout the country have received orders from the postal department at Washington to double their precautions against burglaries as robberies of this nature have increased in an alarming manner during the past month. It was recently stated by an official at Washington that the amount of stamps stolen and unlocated to date would amount to at least \$190,000. It is thought that this loot is being sold by the robbers to stamp brokers located in the larger cities and these men in turn dispose of the stamps at a discount to unscrupulous people.

The greater number of robberies have occurred in second, third and fourth class postoffices, according to the local office today. The thieves in most cases were criminals of experience as they stole only one and two-cent stamp supplies which are the hardest to trace as there is absolutely no method in identifying them. The postal department advises officials in second, third and fourth class postoffices not to overdraw on the supply of stamps of the one and two-cent variety. Postoffices without the proper facilities for the protection of stamps should draw only a two months' supply at a time and the requisition should be turned in only a month before the supply is needed. All postoffices are ordered to take greater precautions against burglaries and to deposit funds and stamps in local banks if the office safe or vault is deemed unreliable. No orders have been received in regard to stamped envelopes and newspaper wrappers, as their bulk is a preventive against burglary. The local office usually carries stamps valued at thousands of dollars in stock, but has an immense vault for the protection of the stickers, and all funds are deposited in a local bank each day. In addition to this, postal clerks are busy day and night in the mail room near the vault.

A NEW FIGURE IN WORLD DIPLOMACY

With the recognition of General Carranza, a new figure has risen in international diplomacy. He is a plain American business man, whose shirt-sleeve diplomacy has done more for Carranza's cause than yards of gold lace and official red-tape could accomplish. The new business diplomat is Richard Hood Cole, of Pasadena, Cal. He is in the diplomatic game because he is Carranza's close friend and was requested by the "First Chief" to keep an eye on the Constitutionalists' affairs in Washington. As a protégé of Lyman J. Gage, former Secretary of the Treasury, Cole has been interested in large financial affairs for years, devoting himself especially to the financing of large enterprises. Living in the Willard hotel with his wife, who has been received in the most select circles of Washington society, he has really been the directing force behind the movement to obtain American recognition for the Constitutional government. Men from California say Cole's hobby is helping others. He is the man who gave Jess Willard his big start toward the world's heavyweight championship by seeking him out and supplying money for him to get and sign up the Jack Johnson fight. Cole knows a slough of world-famous people, some of whom are almost always to be found at his beautiful home in Pasadena. He and Mrs. Cole have lived here in elegance, yet in the greatest simplicity. Both have been lionized since the fact of his close friendship with Mexico's "First Chief" leaked out. Cole's work for Carranza has brought mention of him for an appointment to a prominent diplomatic post under the American Government, where he may yet be a power for American prestige.

CUMMINS IS FOR WOMAN SUFFRAGE
Iowa Senator Thinks Best Plan is to Keep Up the Campaign in the States.
[United Press Leased Wire Service.] DES MOINES, Iowa, Oct. 30.—Senator A. B. Cummins of Iowa is for woman's suffrage. He will do anything in his power for the cause. He is in sympathy with the movement for a constitutional amendment and believes the resolution to submit the amendment to the people will pass congress. Yet, he would not have the workers for suffrage diminish their efforts in state campaigns. In fact, Senator Cummins believes the movement for a constitutional amendment is a "tactical mistake."
The foregoing sentiments were expressed tonight at the senator's home to Mrs. Sara Bard Field, suffrage envoy from the west to congress, and President Wilson and a group of state suffrage leaders. Senator Cummins, feeling that a national campaign will be a mistake, he explained, is based on the assumption that some of the energy would be spent in it that would otherwise be spent in state campaigns. "Unfortunately," said Cummins, "it requires only twelve states to prevent the adoption of the proposed movement. You must get the assent of thirty-six states and you can understand how difficult an undertaking that will be."
"In making a national campaign," said Cummins, "suffrage workers are fighting two forces, one of which would be absent in a state campaign. There are many friends of suffrage," he said, "who also feel strongly on the question of states rights and who would not support and invasion of them. If suffrage were a state question alone, they would be enlisted in the cause."

18,159 EIGHT-CYLINDER CARS BUILT BY CADILLAC
Production Covering Slightly More Than One Year Offers Interesting Comparisons.
Including the cars built and shipped from the factory at Detroit, on October 23, the Cadillac production of its V-type, eight-cylinder model reached the total of 18,159 cars.
Beginning with the shipment of the first eight-cylinder cars, which was October 10, 1914, the production for the even year ending Oct. 9, 1915, was 17,255 cars.
While the figures, of themselves, are interesting, they do not reveal the actual significance of what the Cadillac Company has done to make them possible.
