On one of these vessels, the John Hardie, after the crew had left and the first German shot had been fired, a Hindoo was seen trying to save a companion whose feet were fettered, the paper said. The Germans took both off.

SUNK BY SUBMARINE.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 3.—The German steamship Gedania was sunk by a submarine in the Baltic today.

The Gedania was a vessel of 1,477 tons. Its home port was Danzig and its owners Benke and Sieg.

DENY PEACE TALK.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The German embassy at Madrid today officially denied that Prince Von Beulow was endeavoring to arrange peace, according to a News Agency dispatch from the Spanish capital.
