Samuel Insull, President Commonwealth Edison Co., and Mr. Stone and Mr. Webster Here Today.

ARE ON INSPECTION TRIP

Party Shown Through Mississippi River Power Company's Plant and Taken for Drive This Afternoon.

Samuel Insull, president of the Commonwealth Edison company of Chicago, Martin Insull, his brother, Engineer Sargent of the Commonwealth Edison company, C. A. Stone and E. S. Webster of the Stone & Webster Engineering corporation, and George Higginson, who has charge of the Chicago office of Stone & Webster, were in Keokuk today. The party visited the plant of the Mississippi River Power company and were shown over the big plant in the river here. They called on Manager C. W. Kellogg and were guests at luncheon in the private dining room of the Hotel Iowa. The errand of the party here was simply a trip of inspection, it was stated. They were not selling anything, building anything or buying anything, an official of the company explained to a Gate City reporter. This afternoon following luncheon, the party was taken on a trip along the Lake Shore drive.

PLEADS GUILTY TO MANSLAUGHTER

Alfredo Martinez, Mexican Charged With Murder, Pleads Guilty to Lesser Charge in Court Today.

ILLNESS HALTS OTHERS

Physicians' Certificates Introduced in Cases Alleging Violation of the Cosson Law.

One of the criminal jury cases which was to have been taken up today, was disposed of when Alfredo Martinez, the Mexican charged with first degree murder, pleaded guilty, through his attorney J. M. C. Hamilton, to the charge of manslaughter. Martinez will be sentenced later in the week, when time required by law in such cases has elapsed. When the cases in which defendants are alleged to have violated the Cosson law were called, physicians' certificates were produced by the attorneys for the defendants in which it was stated that the parties were not able to appear in court. Two of the doctors were sent for by the state. The jurors were ordered to appear this afternoon and were in court awaiting their call. If the criminal cases assigned are continued, civil cases will be taken up in their order.

Three Are Sentenced.
John Sand, Bryan Kerraghan and Alvin Carlson, the three young men who pleaded guilty to the charges of breaking and entering, were sentenced by Judge Bank this morning. The sentence imposed was one year in the county jail and a fine of \$100 and costs. The sentence of each of the boys was suspended during good behavior and they were paroled to John C. Scott, sheriff of Lee county. The sheriff is ordered to make a report every three days on the three.

Enters Plea of Guilty.
A plea of guilty has been entered by Hattie Kirby in the charge of keeping a house of ill fame. She was assessed a fine of \$100. On a second charge, that of maintaining a nuisance, she also pleaded guilty, and was given a fine of \$50.

Report is Approved.
The final report in the estate of Joseph Gessner, which was made by Arnold Schmiegel, administrator, was approved by the court.

Ask for New Trial.
In the case of Ewers, administrator vs. John Gibbons, motion for new trial was filed. This motion alleges that the verdict was contrary to the evidence, and that the court erred in giving certain instructions. This case was recently tried upon being remanded from the supreme court, and a verdict was rendered for Gibbons.
