MRS. TUCKER HAS NEW YORK TRIUMPH

Her Folk Songs and Spirituals of the Negroes Received in Splendid Manner by Gotham People.

KREHBEIL APPROVES

Highest Authority on Negro Folk Songs Gives Approval—Maurice Klein is Proud of Singer.

The friends of Mrs. Collingwood Tucker, and that means all Keokuk, will be pleased to know that her song recital, given at the Bandbox theater at New York Sunday afternoon was a personal triumph. This little New York theatre is the last word in Gotham in an artistic way, and a musician who appears there has arrived.

The New York Tribune contains a criticism of Mrs. Tucker's recital written by H. E. Krehbeil. He is the highest authority in America on negro folk-songs and his commendation carried with it greater weight than that of any other American.
The following is from the New York Tribune of November 15:
"There was nothing, perhaps, more indicative of the utterly unconventional, even unprofessional, character of the entertainment given in the Bandbox theatre yesterday afternoon than the fact that there was nothing in the announcement on the house bill which one received after entering the tiny play-house to tell who it was that was to give the entertainment. Not even what its character was to be, unless it could be guessed from the list of titles which followed the general heading 'Songs of the Old South.' As a matter of fact, there is scarcely a definition in our ordinary concert-room terminology which would have fitted the case, for it was neither lecture nor concert, nor even that hybrid thing called a lecture-recital.
"It might have been well had the program mentioned the name of the entertainer, but even that was forgotten, or neglected, and one had to guess that it was Mrs. Collingwood Tucker from some excerpts from newspaper notices printed on the back of the programme.
"The audience, however, not numerous but extremely appreciative and cordial in its expression of approval, seemed well able to dispense with all introductory words. Like Mrs. Tucker, they were from the south (the majority of them, at any rate), and if they did not know her personally they knew by inheritance, or experience, or intuition the songs she had come to sing and talk about, and showed by many a neighborly nudge and smile and hearty laugh how much they enjoyed the reminders of her childhood which had also been theirs, the bits of amiable local color in the pronunciation of some words, the humor and also the pathos of her tales and her songs."

Style Wins Audience.
"Mrs. Tucker's vivacious and unconventional style too completely won the hearts of her listeners to permit them to become critical about the matter and manner of her serious discourse on folk-song in general, with which she began her conversation with her audience. That is what her entertainment was—a conversation enlivened with anecdote and song which, toward the close, when its artistic and scientific purport seemed wholly lost sight of, was, we fancy, like a Sunday afternoon couple of decades ago in Captain Dickson's home in Chattanooga. But that Mrs. Tucker wanted to be serious in style with all her light-heartedness of purpose was evident every little while all through the afternoon. She argued along lines familiar to many Tribune readers in setting forth the nature, significance and beauty of folk-songs in general and Afro-American folk-songs in particular; but her plea in their behalf was much more eloquent in the infectious humor of her singing of 'Hey! Mistah Rabbit' and her deeply emotional interpretation of 'I Couldn't Hear Nobody Pray' than in her arguments. It was something new to those of her listeners who had no experience of the romance of southern plantation life to hear (and see, also) how the old mammys of blessed memory used to put their little charges to sleep, not with the soothing songs prescribed by the methods of the modern scientific nursery, but by singing songs of fearful import

and 'Jist waring 'em out.' Mrs. Tucker's demonstration opened the door to speculation in the psychology of cradle songs. The writer of this notice was reminded of how he came into possession of a beautiful variant of the growing-halad of 'Hugh of Lincoln' as it is called in the history of English balladry.

Terrifying Theme.
"After a lecture some years ago on folksong in America in a New England city, a lady of gentle birth and breeding put in his hands a version of the old song which has ritual murder for its theme, and said she and her family had been sung to sleep by it for generations, and had never once suspected the awfulness of its story. But she could recall vividly one of its melodic effects, because it always made the 'sleepy feeling' come.
"The first part of Mrs. Tucker's entertainment was devoted to secular and religious folksongs; the second, to a song of antebellum days and two illustrating the humor and pathos of southern plantation life during and after the war of the rebellion. Then came specimens of the artistic artistry called forth by the real folksongs and the imitations of them which enlivened negro minstrelsy in its palmy days. She sang 'Kingdom Comin' and 'Camptown Races' rollickingly and unctuously and 'De Ole Home' with a simple pathos which had a special appeal for many of her hearers."

Praise from Maurice Klein.
From Maurice Klein, who sends the program and criticism to The Gate City, comes also the following letter in which he expresses himself as being proud of a friend and of his old home town:
"It ever I was proud of a friend and my home town I was this afternoon.
"I always knew that Mrs. Tucker was talented, but her lecture-recital today was a perfect revelation to me. My! how she has improved in every way. Her wonderful personality, stage presence, perfect control of voice and convincing manner won for her the hearty applause and ecstasies that followed each number on her varied programme.
"Her work was unique and fascinating to those of her audience who did not know her, was doubly appreciated by her Keokuk friends who heard and marvelled at the naturalness and even poise with which she rendered each song. Indeed I closed my eyes and fancied I was in the parlor of her home on Fulton street, to which it was always a delight and pleasure to go, so entirely at home was she on the stage of a New York theatre.
"I sat behind a gentleman who is recognized as the foremost critic not only of New York but of the world, and watched his face while Mrs. Tucker was awaying their audience from laughter to tears and back to laughter and I tell you I was proud—and this man was crying and laughing with the rest of us—that in itself speaks the success that crowned Mrs. Tucker's efforts. As one reviewer of her work has said, 'she takes her listeners into her confidence and leads them to laughter and tears at will.'
"You folks at home should welcome her back with open arms because she has done herself and you all proud, and no one in the world is happier to send this word to you than I.

Gives Full Program.
Mrs. Tucker's program included most of the songs that Keokuk has heard her sing. She gave the folk songs of the negro, the spirituals, plantation melodies and little studies in color.

NEW ORLEANS IS FIGHTING THE RATS

Four Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars Spent in War Against the Rat.
More than \$4,500,000 has been expended in the last year in an effort to make New Orleans rat proof and prevent the reappearance of bubonic plague, according to an announcement by Dr. R. H. Creel of the United States public health service, in charge of the work. Seventy-four thousand five hundred and twenty-six buildings have been made rat proof, about 7,000 not considered worth repairing by the owners have been demolished and work is progressing on 23,261 others. Approximately 37,000 buildings still are to be made rat-proof.

WARSAW IS TO HAVE WHITE WAY

Contract Signed by City Council of That Place, With Keokuk Electric Company.
COMPLETED BY XMAS
Poles and Wires Already Ordered—Original Installation to Cost About \$2,000.

WARSAW, Ill., Nov. 17.—Warsaw, after many months of indecision, has finally decided to install a white way.
At a meeting of the city council Monday evening, which was attended by J. P. Ingle, manager of the Keokuk Electric company, the contracts were signed and construction will start as soon as the material, which has already been ordered, arrives.
Main street of Warsaw will be lighted between Second and Seventh streets. There will be thirty lights installed, six to a block and three on each side of the street, as in Keokuk.
There will be three sixty candle power cluster lights on iron posts. The globes will be fourteen inches in diameter. The original installation will be \$2,000 and the cost will be jointly borne by the Keokuk Electric company, the Warsaw merchants and the city of Warsaw. The expense of running the white way per month will be slightly over \$90.
Underground wiring will be used and all other poles and obstructions on Main street in the five blocks where the white way will be installed, will be taken down. Warsaw merchants will also take down the old wooden porches and awnings and when the improvement is in, the neighboring city will present a changed appearance.
The posts and wires have been ordered and will be in Warsaw in about a month. The Keokuk Electric company hopes to have lights burning by Christmas day. The contract was signed by William L. Hill, the present mayor of Warsaw.

CITY NEWS.

—Next Saturday is the date set for the Keokuk merchant's Thanksgiving Appreciation sale. Copy for advertisements should be in the hands of the printer as early as possible. The merchants who advertise two or three days ahead of the sale, will get the best results as the full circulation of The Gate City will have reached all its readers within a trading radius and thus give opportunity to come to the city and take advantage of the bargains offered.
—War has been declared on whooping cough by the Illinois state board of health. Hereafter this disease is to be treated like small-pox and other serious contagious diseases. All cases of whooping cough in the state must be reported to the local health authorities, who are compelled to put up placards on the premises and establish quarantine. For a period of eight weeks from the date of the first "whoop" or until one week after the characteristic whoop has disappeared, the patient must be kept in the house or yard, and excluded from coming in contact with other children. And other children in the same family cannot go to school, or other places where they will come in contact with children. But parents and other adults in the family may go about their usual business. When the quarantine is raised the premises must be disinfected. The state board proposes to see that the rules are enforced, and there is a heavy penalty under the law for failure to enforce them. The state board now compels quarantine for measles, chickenpox, infantile paralysis, typhoid fever and typhoid "carriers," diphtheria, scarlet fever, etc. Whooping cough causes hundreds of deaths of children and leaves scores of other children in bad physical condition. Many contract pneumonia as a result of whooping cough. It is a dangerous disease and it can be prevented. The people should use care.
