COSTLY PROPOSITION TO RUN OVER SIGN
 Edgar Roberts Fined \$7.85 for Knocking Down Street Traffic Flag on Saturday Night.

It cost Edgar Roberts \$7.85 in the superior court this morning for the pleasure of driving his little Saxon automobile over one of the city's traffic signs. He was the first autist apprehended by the police authorities on this charge. It happened at Twelfth and Main streets at 10:00 o'clock Saturday night with two policemen standing on the corner looking on. In the superior court this morning he pleaded guilty and was fined \$5 and costs, which made the total assessment \$7.85.
 Harry Osgood was fined \$1 and costs for drunkenness, and A. L. Head and John Osborn, costs, on the same charge.

HOLT LIVED HERE SEVERAL YEARS AGO
 Negro Charged With Assault on Policeman's Family Worked for Late Dr. Maxwell.

Lee Holt, the negro who is under arrest at Des Moines and charged with assault on members of the family of Assistant Chief of Police Charles C. Jackson, formerly lived in Keokuk. He was employed by the late Dr. T. J. Maxwell a number of years ago, it was found this morning. Holt is said to have married a Keokuk girl.
 Holt is the brother of William Holt who was committed to the state hospital for the insane at Mt. Pleasant several weeks ago. Holt was charged with having assaulted Mrs. Charles E. Goins, 1923 Franklin, September 22, and was examined for his sanity and ordered sent to the state hospital. Mrs. Goins was in the hospital for a month recovering from injuries sustained.

Suicide Statistics.

 CHICAGO, Nov. 29.—Death by poison, once the favored method among suicides, has greatly fallen off since the European war started, because of the increased cost of drugs, according to Coroner Hoffman. Shooting was the favored method of suicides in Chicago during the eleven months of 1915 when 622 persons took their lives. This is an increase of 49 percent over the number of suicides in 1905 and thirty percent over those of 1910. The population since 1910 has increased only ten percent.
 Crowding out of older workers by young men and women, according to Coroner Hoffman's figures was the cause for the majority of suicides.

KENNEDY LOOKS FOR LONG GRIND

Congressman From First District Expects to be Busy With Preparedness Program This Session.

GUARD BILL MAY PASS
 Suffrage Question May be Given the Vote Again—Has Been Busy With Rural Route Mail Changes.

That the coming session of congress probably will be a long and strenuous one is the opinion of Charles A. Kennedy, congressman from the first district, who was in Keokuk today. Mr. Kennedy will leave for Washington on Wednesday. The preparedness measures will take up much of the time of the coming congress, and Mr. Kennedy expects that suffrage measures may also come up.
 As to the preparedness program, Congressman Kennedy believes that the National Guard bill may be passed. The other measures which the president is said to be planning, such as the continental army and the like are all rather vague so far. The main objection to the continental army scheme is that it seems hard enough now to keep the militia regiments up to full strength.
 As to the various parts of the president's program no one can predict what will happen, because the whole program is still rather vague, and will not be made public until the message is ready. In any event, however, Mr. Kennedy sees plenty of hard work ahead of this congress.

Looking up Rural Routes.
 Mr. Kennedy has had his hands full in this district with the changes in rural routes. Some forty routes have been dropped or consolidated. The rule has been changed so that patrons within a mile are considered served instead of within the half mile limit as formerly. The lines are run down every alternate section line, making the farmers in the middle go a mile for their mail. When they have been accustomed to having mail at their doors, they naturally are complaining.
 Senator Cummins has considerable strength among the western states for president, Mr. Kennedy believes. There doesn't seem to be any one possible candidate who stands out above the field at the present time.
