HERE'S BEST TIME TO CROSS BRIDGE OUT ALL NIGHT, JURY DISAGREED

Persons Driving From Hamilton and Nearby Are Directed to Cross Structure Following Interurbans.

THIS WILL AVOID DELAY

Numerous Inquiries Have Been Made and Answer is Given in Shape of Schedules to and From Hamilton.

Inquiry is being made by the people from Hamilton and the surrounding district who drive across the bridge to Keokuk as to what are the best times for crossing the structure now that there are delays from the construction work. A number of persons seem to be afraid that they may be delayed in crossing the bridge, and would like to know when would be the best times for crossing.

If these people will plan to follow the interurban cars over, they will have practically no trouble in crossing the bridge. The track is cleared for several minutes after the interurban cars pass, and if people who are driving will plan to be at the east and west toll houses when the interurban cars go on the bridge, they can follow the cars over and be saved possible delays.

Here's the schedule. For the convenience of the people who will drive across the bridge the following interurban schedule is given:

Leaving Hamilton Junction— 6:40, 8:05, 9:40, 11:25 a. m. and 1:05, 3:20, 5:05, 7:20, 9:05, 10:25 and 11:40 p. m.
Leaving Keokuk—6:25, 7:00, 8:45, 10:15 a. m. and 12:10, 2:30, 4:10, 6:05, 7:45, 9:30 and 10:45 p. m.
Five to ten minutes less way may be given at the Keokuk end of the bridge, and five minutes or more can be counted on for the Hamilton side. This will get teams and autos to the gates in ample time to be admitted following the passage of an interurban car or a train. By remembering this schedule the people from across the river will have little trouble making the trip here.

No Decision in Case of Hawkes vs. Ulrich Which Has Been Occupying Attention of District Court.

REPORTED AT 10 O'CLOCK

Foreman Told Judge Bank That There Was No Chance for Verdict and Other Jurors Agreed.

The jury in the case of E. E. Hawkes vs. Robert Ulrich, after an all night session, failed to reach an agreement and so reported to Judge Henry Bank in the district court this morning. After making certain that there was no possibility of an agreement, the court discharged the jury-men. The case will have to be heard a second time unless an agreement between parties is reached in the meantime. The case was given to the jury late in the afternoon yesterday, and the twelve men retired. They failed to come to any agreement during the night and reported this morning. The jurors were excused to report at two o'clock this afternoon when another jury case was scheduled.
