### CHRISTMAS DAY ON WALL STREET

Thousands of Dollars in Cash to be Given as Gifts to Clerks of Prosperous Offices.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—Wall street is going to celebrate Christmas in the good old fashioned way. This means the street will forget all about expenses.

Plans are under way today for the collection of a huge fund to be distributed among the employes of the stock exchange and boom-time bonuses will be accorded the employes of individual firms.

In the years before the war's depression put a temporary quietus on the fringe of money on the street, the annual fund for the stock exchange employes amounted to from \$11,000 to \$15,000 and clerks and other private employes received bonuses equivalent to a week's salary. Those gifts will be equalled or exceeded this year by the return of prosperity to the street.

"War babies" and more conservative stocks are strong as a result of the announcement of unusual quarterly dividends, another striking evidence of big profits by American firms. Eleven corporations to date have been announced as contemplating increasing dividends.

Western Union, Utah Copper, Butte and Superior Mining, Chino-Copper, Ray Consolidated, Nevada Consolidated, Submarine Boat, Homestake Mining, Savoy Oil and Anaco are the stocks on which the increases will be paid.
